AFFIDAVIT OF DANNY RODGERS (Sworn August 28, 2023)

I, **DANNY RODGERS**, of the City of Barrie in the Province of Ontario, **MAKE OATH AND SAY**:

- 1. I am the General Manager of Development Services and the Chief Building Official for the Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach (the "**Town**"). As such, I have personal knowledge of the matters hereinafter deposed to. Where I specify that my knowledge is based on the information of others, I verily believe this information to be true.
- 2. Wasaga Beach is a town in Simcoe County boasting the longest freshwater beach in the world. Attached as **Exhibit "A"** is a page from the Wasaga Beach website.
- The Town's population was reported as 24,862 as of the 2021 census and it is a tourism destination and has approximately 2 million visitors each year. See Exhibit "A" and attached as Exhibit "B" is the Statistic Canada 2021 Census Information.
- 4. In 2017, the Town passed its Downtown Development Master Plan which is a 20year strategy for significant redevelopment of the tourist area and adding a downtown to the business area. Attached as **Exhibit "C"** is an excerpt from the Town's Master Plan.

6. It is noted in the Executive Summary at Exhibit "C" that,

Rebranding Wasaga Beach to shake the "party-town" image and replacing the brand with a more sophisticated, diversified and inclusive approach is important to the future economic success of the town.

History of Unsanctioned Car Rallies in the Town

2020

- 7. An "H2Oi" branded car rally has been coming to Wasaga Beach without permits or authorization since the year 2020.
- 8. According to a news article,

H2Oi made its first appearance in Wasaga Beach in September 2020, when vehicle owners descended on the community rather than make the traditional trip to Ocean City, Md., as the border was closed due to the pandemic.

Attached as **Exhibit "D"** is an article from 2023 entitled, "We want you to respect our municipality': Wasaga Beach targets 'unauthorized' car rallies with new bylaw".

- 9. The H2Oi event in 2020 required Ontario Provincial Police "OPP" officers to break up large crowds and resulted in the police having to stop non-residents from entering the Town on Saturday September 26, 2020. Attached as Exhibit "E" is an article from 2020 entitled, "Police close off Wasaga Beach, Ont. to nonresidents after car rally".
- 10. There were an estimated 500 800 cars in attendance at the 2020 event with 172 charges, 44 vehicles towed and 10 people charged for violating COVID restrictions. Attached as **Exhibit "F"** is a November 18, 2021 staff report on the H2Oi Unsanctioned Car Rally Costs and Policing Impacts.

2021

11. H2Oi returned to Wasaga Beach the weekend of September 24 – 26, 2021 where approximately 1,000 vehicles attended resulting in 380 charges and 70 vehicles being pulled off the road for street racing or fore being unfit for the road. Attached as **Exhibit "G"** is an article from 2021 entitled, "'This costs the province, every taxpayer': Here is what the H2Oi car event cost Wasaga Beach".

- 12. The response required to address the unsanctioned event was hundreds of thousands of dollars, including more than \$46,000 in Town resources. These expenses are paid for by the residents of Ontario and through Wasaga Beach property taxes. Attached as **Exhibit "H"** is an article from 2021 entitled, "Wasaga Beach unsanctioned car rally 'cost the province, every taxpayer'".
- 13. The Town is unable to recoup these expenses from the organizers and attendees of the events. Even with charges being laid and fines paid, the costs to prevent, enforce, police, and prosecute this illegal event far exceeds the amount the Town would ever receive from charges.
- 14. The costs to taxpayers from these events is exorbitant, as noted in Exhibit "G".

2022

- 15. The H2Oi events in 2022 were especially egregious and problematic for the Town. I recall that there were incidents of crowds swarming OPP officers, as well as around Town equipment being used for road blockage. Additionally, firetrucks were swarmed and firefighting equipment was removed and taken from these vehicles.
- 16. The first 2022 H2Oi event took place the weekend of August 26 28, 2022 and resulted in 191 charges being laid. 154 were Highway Traffic Act-related, including 37 for speeding, 18 for an improper or no muffler and six for unnecessary noise. Three motorists were charged with impaired driving. Two OPP vehicles parked at Beck and Main streets had their windows smashed out; officers, and a police dog, were in the vehicles at the time. Attached as **Exhibit "I"** is an article from 2022 outlining this event.
- 17. That same article notes that the Town tried to work with organizers to have them hold a legal event:

Bifolchi said town officials had made efforts to reach out to the purported organizers in the past to urge them to go through the town's special events process, but had not received a response. "I call on the car rally community to consider working with us. An organized and safe gathering is possible here," she said.

- 18. Soon after the first event ended, an additional 20 individuals were charged with 37 Criminal Code of Canada and Highway Traffic Act offences stemming from the rally. Attached as **Exhibit "J"** is an article from 2022 entitled, "OPP charge 20 in connection with unsanctioned car rally in Wasaga Beach ahead of another H20i event this weekend"
- 19. The second event of 2022 took place the weekend of September 23 25, 2022.

- 20. By early Saturday night on September 24, 2022, police reported that 136 provincial offences notices had been issued for Highway Traffic Act violations and a driver was caught travelling 131km/h in an 80 km/h zone. Attached as **Exhibit "K"** is an article from 2022 entitled, "Ontario Provincial Police out in full force to address car rally in Wasaga Beach".
- 21. There were two incidents in 2022 where H2Oi attendee damaged a police car, one of which had officers and a K9 unit inside. Attached as **Exhibit "L"** is an article from 2022 entitled, "This behaviour will not be tolerated': 25-year-old London man charged with damage to cruiser duringH2Oi event in Wasaga Beach".
- 22. There was further destruction of private property where crowds caused damage at the Walmart and I recall that they collapsed a roof at the Canadian Tire.
- 23. Some of the chaos is summarized in a news article:

One YouTube video shows a massive street party, people using their iPhones to film drivers doing donuts, tires smoking, cars revving their engines, and one man jumping on the windshield of an OPP cruiser.

Attached as **Exhibit "M"** is an article from 2022 entitled, "Windows smashed on 2 OPP police vehicles during car rally in Wasaga Beach, Ont."

- 25. Other H2Oi events have resulted in similar issues and even death from out-ofcontrol cars at these events.
- 26. Attached as **Exhibit "N"** is an article from 2022 entitled, "Bystanders say Wildwood invaded, police outmanned as H2oi car meet-up turned deadly".
- 27. Attached as **Exhibit "O"** is an article from 2022 entitled, "Driver who slammed into family in golf cart during Wildwood H2oi car rally faces assault charges".
- 28. Attached as **Exhibit "P"** is an article from 2022 entitled, "Driver charged in fatal H2oi wreck was fleeing another accident before crash that killed 2, cops say".

- 29. Attached as **Exhibit "Q"** is an article from 2022 entitled, "Police start blocking streets in area town amid concerns over car rally".
- 30. Wasaga Beach Mayor Brian Smith has stated the Town's position on these events:

"Illegal events, and illegal car rallies organized by people that do not have permits and do not respect the law, are not welcome in Wasaga Beach. They threaten the safety of our residents, visitors and local businesses ... they risk people's lives."

Attached as **Exhibit "R"** is an article from 2023 entitled, "They risk people's lives': Wasaga Beach ups response in preparation for illegal car rallies".

By-laws Prohibiting Such Events

- 31. There are several by-laws that have been enacted in the Town to address the nuisance and dangers posed by events like this one.
- 32. Attached as **Exhibit "S**" is a true copy of By-law no. 2018-99 being A By-law to regulate Special Events in the Town of Wasaga Beach.
- 33. Attached as **Exhibit "T"** is a true copy of By-law no. 2019-15 being the "Noise and Nuisance By-law".
- 34. Attached as **Exhibit "U"** is a true copy of By-law no. 2019-115 being a By-law to amend By-law No. 2019-15.
- 35. Attached as **Exhibit "V**" is a true copy of By-law no. 2023-75 being a By-law to amend By-law No. 2019-15.
- 36. In response to the serious threats to public safety and public nuisance from unsanctioned car rallies and similar events, Council for the Town enacted By-law 2023-74 being A By-Law to Prohibit Vehicular Nuisance Events and known as the "Car Rally By-law". A true copy of the By-law certified by the municipal Clerk is attached as **Exhibit "W"**.
- 37. Subsequent to the passing of the Car Rally By-law, the Town amended the by-law to include an offence provision through By-law 2023-89. Attached as **Exhibit "X"** is a true copy of By-law 2023-89.
- 38. The Town also recently passed a Downtown Community Safety Zone by-law to address safety concerns in the downtown core. Attached as **Exhibit "Y"** is a copy of By-law 2023-86.

The Respondents are Breaching Town By-laws

- 39. As a result of the promotion of another illegal "pop-up" car rally that the Town was successful in preventing earlier this year, I began following a number of Instagram accounts that promote car rallies and "takeovers". I have been checking these accounts for posts daily.
- 40.1 became aware that a car rally was being planned when the Instagram account @h20i.ca3 "h20i Canada" made a post on or around July 12, 2023 that an event would be held September 1 – 4, 2023. Attached as **Exhibit "Z**" is a screenshot of the now-removed post.
- 41. I also saw that H2Oi was letting people know that they wanted to make sure to not get shut down too early and that there should be no burnouts or drifting until 1AM. Attached as **Exhibit "Aa**" is a screenshot of this post.
- 42. In response to these posts, I observed that people commented with links to notify the organizer that the Town had passed a by-law to prohibit these types of events.
- 43. After these comments, the posts were removed.
- 44. After the removal of the posts, a new Instagram account was created on or around August 13, 2023 being @h20i_wasaga "H20i canada" which has distributed posts and stories in violation of the By-law.
- 45. This account posts pictures and "stories" multiple times nearly every day. It also encourages people to share these posts. Attached as **Exhibit** "**Bb**" is a collection of some of the screenshots of posts and stories.
- 46. Numerous other Instagram pages appear to be working in conjunction with @h20i_wasaga and have cross-posted messaging aimed at increasing the number of people attending this event.
- 47. The following accounts have made or shared posts on Instagram promoting the illegal event to their followers and the public generally:

@h20i_wasaga "H20i canada" who has an audience of ~1,118 followers.

@officialphatfarmcarmeets "PHATFARMCARMEETS" who has an audience of ~25,200 followers.

@totakeovers "Underground Street Parties" who has an audience of ~28,200 followers.

@phantom_meets_gta "Phantom Meets GTA" who has an audience of ~20,900 followers.

@theundrgrdstore "TheUnderGroundStore" who has an audience of ~177 followers.

- 48. Many of the other pages make posts glorifying stunt driving. Attached as **"Exhibit Cc**" are screenshots of posts and videos showing stunt driving.
- 49. I do not know if @h20i_wasaga is related to the original account being @h20i.ca3, but I do know that it is the entity who is organizing and promoting this illegal car rally.
- 50. Whether or not this new page is connected with the H2Oi group is inconsequential. Regardless of who is behind this page, it is breaching the Car Rally By-law and is encouraging large numbers of people to come to Wasaga Beach September 1 – 4, 2023.
- 51.Additionally, @h20i_wasaga has an online store where is it selling merchandise for this event for profit. The store is currently no longer available online, but I do have screenshots of the Instagram advertising posts. Attached as **Exhibit "Dd"** is a collection of screenshots of the advertising posts.
- 52. This profile has advertised a "Telegram" chat to promote and organize this event which I have joined. Currently the chat has 124 members since it was started on August 23, 2023. Attached as **Exhibit "Ee"** are screenshots of the conversations.
- 53. Notably, there are messages in Exhibit "Ee" showing the attendees' and organizers' intentions to have a "take over" party style event. For example,

"Block party should be on the beach drive take over beach one"

"Block the entrance so cops can't get in do what they did to us lol"

"Real shit if mans keep it chill and keep the fuckery for the block party we can FUCK IT UP"

"She ready to claim wasaga"

"If this shits dead we might as well just all get fucked up" "that's regardless"

- 54.1 have not completed a detailed search of Instagram posts, but believe that the posts promoting this illegal event are being more widely circulated.
- 55. The organizers and promoters are telling the public that they are seeking permits and approvals from the Town for this car rally. Attached as **Exhibit "Ff"** are screenshots of posts stating that permits are in the works.

- 56. More recently, the posts have indicated that permits are slowly being approved for lots. Attached as **Exhibit "Gg"** are screenshot of these posts.
- 57. I have made inquiries with representatives of the Town and understand that there has been no contact with the Town to discuss such an event, nor submission of a permit application.
- 58. Without approval and permitting from the Town, this is an illegal event.
- 59. I believe that stating that this is an event that is or will be permitted is to encourage more people to attend this illegal event under the false pretense that it is not illegal.
- 60. Even if the intentions of the organizers are to avoid illegal behaviour, the fact that this is not a permitted event means that there is no one who is accountable for the actions of the crowd, nor is there appropriate insurance in place to cover damages to property, health, or human life.
- 61. The Town has been actively coordinating with the local detachment of the OPP to prepare for and respond to this illegal event.

Identity of the Respondents

62.1 have looked through the online accounts and posts as well as spoken with representatives from the OPP to attempt to determine who the individuals behind these accounts are, but have not been able to identify them.

By-laws will be Breached if the Illegal Event Cannot be Stopped

- 63.1 have observed, and do verily believe, that many of the attendees at past H2Oi events have breached Town by-laws.
- 64. The fact that many Highway Traffic Act and municipal by-law charges have been laid each time this illegal event takes place is proof of that.

Concerns with Public Safety and Nuisance

- 65. In addition to the crowd that the illegal event is anticipated to draw, the Town expects the ordinary and customary increase in visitors that weekend as it is the Labour Day long weekend.
- 66. During the last long-weekend in August, there was a great deal of traffic with 2hour-long delays. Attached as **Exhibit "Hh"** is an article entitled, "Extraordinary volume' of traffic creates gridlock in Wasaga Beach".

- 67. A 2-hour delay to traverse the main beach is significant, as it takes approximately 8 minutes in regular traffic. Attached as **Exhibit "li"** is a screenshot of Google Maps showing the travel time by car from Provincial Park 1 to Provincial Park 4.
- 68. It is anticipated that the upcoming Labour Day long weekend will draw even larger crowds because of the events planned for that weekend.
- 69. The Town has organized and planned a series of free concerts for its event called 'Memories of Summer' for the Labour Day long weekend which is expected to draw large crowds.
- 70.On Friday September 1, 2023 beginning at 6:00pm is music by Jamie Drake and The Thunderstealers. Attached as **Exhibit** "**Jj**" is a copy of the event information posted on the Town website.
- 71.On Saturday September 2, 2023 beginning at 6:00pm is music and dancing by Mariachi Fuego. Attached as **Exhibit** "**Kk**" is a copy of the event information posted on the Town website.
- 72. Sunday September 3, 2023 is the main event beginning at 10:00am which includes family entertainment and games for all ages. Live music begins with Grace at 6:00pm; The Carpet Frogs at 7:20pm; and April Wine at 8:40. A fireworks show will begin at 10:00pm. Attached as **Exhibit "LI"** is a copy of the event flyer.
- 73. In my opinion, April Wine is fairly described as a Canadian Iconic rock band. As such, they are expected to draw a large crowd.
- 74.1 have reviewed the April Wine website and see that most shows over the past few months have been sold-out, including two shows on August 4 and 5, 2023 at the Kee to Bala, about one hour north-east of Wasaga Beach which holds 2,500 attendees. Attached as **Exhibit "Mm"** is a screenshot of the April Wine website.
- 75. It is difficult to speculate how many people will attend the Memories of Summer event as it is a free event where tickets are not needed. However, I have spoken with the Town's event staff who estimate 12,000 15,000 people will attend each day throughout the weekend.
- 76. The Town has a policy to govern Municipally Significant Public Special Events. Attached as **Exhibit "Nn"** is a copy of this policy being By-law 2016-25.
- 77. A great deal of Town resources are spent to draw in tourism and host or support legal events that are helpful to businesses and residents.
- 78. If this illegal car rally cannot be stopped, there will be an unreasonable strain on the Town's staff and resources and I anticipate that officials will be unable to effectively respond to the volume of calls and complaints. As stated above, there

is the added issue that these expenses cannot be recouped from the organizers and participants of this illegal event.


- 79. On this weekend, it is not a permitted weekend to sell fireworks in the community. This group has a history of lighting off fireworks horizontally into crowds. There is a concern that the individuals attending this event will bring in fireworks to promote chaos and which could cause serious injuries.
- 80. Despite the language in posts about the illegal event, the result will no-doubt be a "takeover" style event where a large crowd of people come to the Town where roadways and police resources will be overwhelmed.
- 81. Additionally, language in these posts suggests that the rules are simply for show, as a "winky-face" appears after stating that there will be to burnouts.
- 82. There has also been discussion online about keeping the daytime events calm so that the event is not shut down before the night time when the chaos will ensue.
- 83. Regardless of the intentions of the organizers, without receiving a permit for a lawful event, there is no person or corporation responsible for the attendees and no insurance policy to make sure that the Town is indemnified and that accidents and incidents can be paid for.
- 84. If a group wants to come to Wasaga Beach and hold an event in the community, one must go through the proper process to get approvals.
- 85. The process for getting approvals is for an organizer to fill out an application and get Town approval. This event has not done that. Attached as **Exhibit "Oo"** is a copy of the application.
- 86. Part of this process is making sure that the organizers have appropriate liability insurance and that the Town can prepare for large events to avoid unsafe events or overlaps in large events.
- 87. I am greatly concerned about the threats to public safety and public nuisance from the illegal car rally event, which is increased by the overlap with other events taking place in Wasaga Beach this same weekend.
- 88. The Town has made media releases to educate the public about this illegal event but it has not stopped the advertising and planning of the event. Attached as **Exhibit "Pp"** is the Wasaga Beach media release entitled, "Council Takes Action to Strengthen Town's Emergency Preparedness and Improve its Highly Coordinated Town-OPP Response to Illegal Car Rallies".

- 89. On behalf of the Town, we provide an undertaking as to damages to abide by any subsequent order the Court may make to pay the defendant's damages stemming from injunctive relief.
- 90.1 make this affidavit in support of the Town's Application and Motion for injunctive relief and for no other or improper purpose.








1.1 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report was prepared by FORREC Limited, in association with N. Barry Lyon Consultants Limited, CBRE Tourism and Leisure Group and J.C. Williams Group, and is the culmination of a four month long community engagement process founded on best professional practices.

'We want you to respect our municipality': Wasaga Beach targets 'unauthorized' car rallies with new bylaw

Wasaga Beach has been the scene of so-called 'pop-up' car rallies associated with H2Oi for three years running

A new bylaw aims to put the brakes on unauthorized car rallies showing up in Wasaga Beach.

Council has approved new rules that would bar an individual from planning, advertising and hosting a rally without the permission of the municipality.

It also carries penalties for spectators, and allows law enforcement, the fire chief or bylaw officers to close a road to the public for a period of up to three days to prevent or stop a car rally from happening.

The bylaw was spurred by the so-called "pop-up" car rally commonly referred to as H2Oi, which features high-performance modified vehicles. While some drivers come just to show off their wheels, the unsanctioned events also feature unsafe driving practices such as doughnuts, drifting and burnouts, with gatherings taking place in private and public parking lots at all hours of the day.

H2Oi made its first appearance in Wasaga Beach in September 2020, when vehicle owners descended on the community rather than make the traditional trip to Ocean City, Md., as the border was closed due to the pandemic.

In preparation for the return of the rally in 2021, the OPP increased its presence in the community and mustered its resources across the province. In some cases, drivers were intercepted by police before their arrival in Wasaga Beach and sent home.

The 2022 version appeared to feature even more mayhem, including one incident that saw two OPP cruisers damaged while officers were in the vehicles. Charges were laid against a London man, whose case remains before the courts.

The town's general manager of development services business unit, Danny Rodgers, who authored the bylaw, said it is an important tool for the municipality to try to bring the situation under control.

"If we're able to identify who the event organizer is, then we're within our right to serve an order on them to discontinue the activity," he said, adding that includes individuals who live outside the municipality.

"We're dipping into our tool box within the Municipal Act to do everything possible so that we can create an environment here that is safe for our bylaw officers and allows us to align our efforts with the efforts of the OPP."

Rodgers added that if organizers want to apply for an event application and be sanctioned by the town, "we're happy to work with organizers to make that happen."

"We welcome organized events in our community; they're good for our community," he said. "The ones that cross the line are just not welcome here."

Council praised the intent of the bylaw before approving it.

"I'm grateful we're taking careful, proactive steps to try to get ahead of the situation, and work so closely with ... the OPP," Deputy Mayor Tanya Snell said. "We welcome car events and car enthusiasts ... but we do not welcome people or groups who want to put our community at risk."

"We invite everyone to come and enjoy our town," Mayor Brian Smith added. "We want you to come here, we want you to have fun, (but) we want you to respect our municipality and the people who live here."






BARRIE -- Provincial police stopped non-residents from entering Wasaga Beach, Ont. on Saturday night after hundreds of people gathered for a large, unsanctioned car rally.

Inside the town, officers tried to break up large crowds. OPP Sgt. Jason Folz said officers were equipped with non-lethal weapons that shoot large plastic bullets, though he says they were not fired. These types of weapons are used for crowd control.



RECOMMENDATION

That the Community Services Section of Coordinated Committee recommend to Council that it receive the CAO's report on the costs and policing impacts of the H2Oi unsanctioned car rally held the weekend of September 24 to 26, 2021 in the Town of Wasaga Beach.

BACKGROUND

Shortly after the H2Oi unsanctioned car rally in September 2020, OPP representatives met with Town staff to review their approach to policing the event. As Committee may recall, the event in 2020 occurred with very little advance notice. Events like this had been taking place in the United States for many years, but due to the boarder between Canada and the US closing to unnecessary travel as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, participants decided to stay in Ontario. This was the first H2Oi event in Ontario. There had been similar smaller events in the GTHA, but this was the first large event.

The OPP used their experience and the experience from colleagues on GTHA police forces to quickly devise a plan to provide policing services to the community for that weekend. Unfortunately there wasn't sufficient time to plan in 2020 and the OPP found themselves spread across Town attending three large gatherings. They estimated that there were between 500 to 800 cars in attendance that weekend.

The OPP, and police from Peel, York, Barrie and South Simcoe that assisted that weekend issued 172 tickets, towed 44 vehicles and charged 10 people under the COVID-19 restrictions. There was minimal property damage and one minor injury.

The writer, Mayor, Fire Chief, Deputy Fire Chief met with the Huronia West OPP Detachment Commander and his Manager of Operations to review the weekend. A number of determinations were made.

1. From this event and similar events that had been occurring in the GTHA police forces had determined that the Highway Traffic Act was deficient, either in the type of violations occurring or in the amount of the fine, in addressing what police forces were seeing at these events.

In response the Mayor sent a letter to the province requesting that the Act be amended to address the issue the police had identified. This was in addition to requests made by the Chiefs of Police Association. Some months later the province enacted legislation to address a number of concerns.

- 2. The OPP need an "Incident Command" structure to manage the event instead of just the local detachment managing it.
- 3. Need to involve other OPP Divisions such the Highway Safety and the Emergency Response Team and other resources within the OPP to ensure community safety,
- 4. Need to close off as many parking lots as possible to make it difficult for the organizers to congregate.
- 5. If the organizers of H2Oi indicate that they wish to come back, to reach out to them to see if they wish to organize a proper event. It was noted that the people involved do not like to be organized, they just like to show up at a designated location.

The OPP indicated that they would continue to monitor the situation across the province and assist other police forces when these types of events pop up to build on their experiences. They would also use their contacts to determine if the participants were thinking of coming back to Wasaga Beach.

In early July 2021, the writer was asked to attend a meeting with the OPP to discuss H2Oi. Other Town staff attended as well. At the meeting, staff was advised that the OPP had good reason to believe that the H2Oi event was coming back to Wasaga Beach in September 2021. With this information it was determined that the Regional Traffic Manager would lead the OPP's response. Three levels of the OPP would be involved, Provincial, Central Region and Local Detachment, with assistance from other police forces.

At the meeting the OPP outlined their plan to address the event if it were to come. They also asked for the Town's assistance to block off parking lots. Their primary focus was to ensure community and public safety.

They also confirmed that the leaders of these types of events are not interested in being sanctioned.

In early August, the Mayor along with the writer and other Town staff met with the OPP again to discuss the H2Oi event. At that meeting it was confirmed the event was coming to Wasaga Beach the weekend of September 24th. The OPP discussed their plan and confirmed the Town's assistance in closing parking lots.

The OPP confirmed that as the event could potentially have an impact on community and public safety and they anticipated illegal vehicles participating, they were taking the lead on the response.

In mid-August another H2Oi meeting was held with OPP representatives where the Incident Commander and other members of the OPP leadership team were introduced. It was confirmed that the OPP were anticipating approximately 1,500 vehicles coming to Wasaga Beach for the event. The OPP outlined their media campaign do discourage illegal activities. They also confirmed the policing resources they were planning to bring, including officers from Barrie, South Simcoe and York. The Town was asked to provide a compound where vehicle that are towed could be held and allow the OPP to use the Town's security camera system to monitor activity at key locations in Town.

The OPP were planning on speaking with the owners of major parking lots asking them for permission to place speed bumps at the entrances to discourage low slung cars to enter and to issue no-trespassing orders so that the police would have the authority to remove unwanted vehicles.

A few days prior to the September 25th weekend, public works staff placed speed bumps made of reuseable cold patch at various large parking lots in Town where the OPP had obtained prior approvals from the owners or owners' representative to place the bumps.

DISCUSSION

Leading up to the weekend some adjustments had to be made to the speed bumps due to complaints being received. One out of town owner claimed he knew nothing of the speed bumps going in at the entrances to his property and vehemently denied that approval was granted until the OPP confirmed with him that his local representative had given the OPP written permission to have the speed bumps placed. The speed bumps were removed from his property over night.

Over the weekend regular communication occurred between the OPP, the Fire Department and other key staff. A formal review of the weekend was conducted by the OPP and then discussed with staff a few days afterwards. The following are some of the key points from the review:

- 1. The OPP estimate that there were under 1,000 cars in Town participating in the H2Oi unsanctioned car rally the weekend of September 25th. On Saturday afternoon, in the Walmart parking, lot the OPP estimate that 700 cars were present.
- 2. Approximately 70 officers and support personal were deployed, including representatives from five different police forces.
- 3. There were no civilian or police injuries and property damage was minimal
- 4. No complaints from the public were lodged with the OPP
- 5. Community and pubic safety was maintained
- 6. OPP were deployed on roads leading to Wasaga Beach, including the 400 series highways and several cars were pulled over and owners issued POA notices
- 7. Helicopter and drones were very helpful in monitoring participant movements
- 8. Town security cameras were helpful and showed the break-in into the upper unit at 41 Beach Drive, leading to the arrest of three H2Oi participants for break and enter
- 9. The policing actions that were captured on video and posted on social media were reviewed by OPP command with the individual and witnesses and no further action was required
- 10. Statistics reported by the OPP are as follows:
 - There were a total of 488 Calls for Service
 - 220 occurrences resulted in charges
 - 399 charges were laid in total, include the break and entering (most of these in Wasaga Beach, but some in the municipalities of Clearview and Springwater as well)
 - Top Occurrence Types:
 - 194 Vehicle eTickets
 - 52 Traffic Complaints
 - 44 HTA Traffic Enforcement
 - 22 Person eTicket
 - 18 police Assistance-ambulance, fire, bylaw
 - Top Charges:
 - 50 Speeding 1-49 over the speed limit
 - 41 Improper muffler

- 17 fail to display 2 plates

The occurrence details are contained in the attached report prepared by the OPP.

The intersection of Mosley Street and 1st Street, Main Street and the Walmart Parking lot on Saturday were the main gathering points. Police were able to disperse the Mosley and Main Street crowds, but were only able to control the crowd at the Walmart Parking lot. Approximately 700 participants were able to congregate in the Walmart parking lot, as the speed bumps had been removed.

The Town was made aware of complaints from businesses and customers about the participant activities on Main Street and the Walmart Parking lot. Fortunately, no one was hurt.

<u>Costs</u>

The OPP have advised that the cost of provincial resources that attended Wasaga Beach for the weekend will be charged to the provincial activity component of the OPP budget. This includes the Highway Safety Division, Community Safety Team, Tactical Team, Aviation Services, Provincial Liaison Team and Media Relations. There were approximately 50 personnel involved over the weekend. These costs are paid for by all Ontario taxpayers.

The costs to the Town are as follows:

**** The OPP overtime incurred from this event will be included in the overall 2021 overtime incurred by the OPP in Wasaga Beach. Overtime incurred in 2021 will be averaged with the 2020, 2019, and 2018 overtime to determine the estimated 2023 overtime cost for Wasaga Beach. For comparison purposes only, the overtime estimate the 2022 OPP policing cost estimate is \$286,536.00.

CONCLUSION

Fortunately there were no injuries or major property damage the weekend of September 25th during the H2Oi unsanctioned car rally. The OPP used the experience gained from the 2020 H2Oi rally to put in place an effective operations plan that ensured the community and the public were kept safe. There were no formal complaints from the public filed with the OPP and alleged incidents that were caught on video and shared on social media were investigated and no further action was taken.

A significant number of charges were laid and many unsafe vehicles were taken off the road, some even before they arrived in Wasaga Beach.

The cost of this unsanctioned rally to the taxpayers of Wasaga Beach is significant. Not only do Wasaga Beach residents and businesses pay for a portion of the OPP provincial cost through their provincial taxes, they pay the OPP overtime and Public Works Department costs through their local property taxes.

The OPP and the Town have identified a number of things that could be done differently or better the next time an event like this occurs. Having stated that, it is the position of staff that the OPP did an excellent job the weekend of the H2Oi rally ensuring the safety of the community.



'This costs the province, every taxpayer': Here is what the H2Oi car event cost Wasaga Beach

OPP cost to Wasaga Beach to control H2Oi event will be averaged out over 4 years

The full cost to try to contain an unsanctioned car rally in September may not be known for another couple of years.

According to a report to Wasaga Beach council's co-ordinated committee from chief administrative officer George Vadeboncoeur, the direct costs to the municipality for the H2Oi event were more than \$46,000 for overtime, regular wages, and vehicle use. The town's public works department put down about \$6,500 worth of cold patch asphalt for use as speed bumps, but that material can be reused.

On the last weekend of September, about 1,000 modified high-performance vehicles — some not street legal — turned up in town as part of an unsanctioned rally. It was the second year in a row that car owners, many from out of province, turned up to the event that features some participants take part in what police say are "aggressive displays" of stunt driving, such as doughnuts, burnouts and drifting.

The event drew significant police response, locally and provincially, and the OPP warned participants ahead of the weekend not to show up.

Officers laid more than 380 charges against drivers for violating a variety of provincial laws while on area roads during the weekend. The OPP also pulled 70 vehicles off the road Saturday and Sunday, including 22 for stunt driving and 33 that were considered unfit for the road.

OPP officials told council during a meeting in October that the police response resulted in more than 2,400 hours of overtime that the municipality would eventually see on its annual bill from the provincial service.

During the committee meeting on Nov. 18, Vadeboncoeur said those costs would be averaged out with overtime costs from the previous three years in an effort to "smooth out" the financial impact to the municipality.

Most of council expressed their scorn with participants and organizers — as well as those in the community who say the event should be accommodated rather than met with enforcement.

"It's a substantial cost that the municipality incurred with this illegal event," Coun. George Watson said. "In spite of a number of people putting their political ambitions in front of community safety by endorsing this event, it's a big cost."

Mayor Nina Bifolchi noted while it is a cost to the municipality, there is also a cost to all Ontario taxpayers as the OPP had a provincewide response.

"This costs the province, every taxpayer, hundreds of thousands of dollars. These events, as a whole, are expensive," she said.

"People around town may be saying just kids having fun," added Coun. David Foster. "Those people are naive if they think it's just kids having fun and there's no cost to it. There's a huge cost, whether it's held here or Temiskaming, we're still paying."

Vadeboncoeur said it remains to be seen whether the vehicles and their owners return in 2022, as drivers and their vehicles had been travelling to Ocean City, Maryland prior to the border closing in 2020 as a result of the pandemic.

"With the borders reopening, it will be wait and see whether they return to what they used to do, or come back (to Wasaga Beach)," he said. "If they decide to come back, the OPP will be here and we'll see a similar breakdown in cost."





Wasaga Beach unsanctioned car rally 'cost the province, every taxpayer'

BARRIE, ONT. - A recent report prepared for council in Wasaga Beach sheds new light on the impacts of an unsanctioned car rally earlier this fall.

A report prepared by CAO George Vadeboncouer highlights the significant law enforcement resources that were called in on the last weekend of September to help control crowds from the unsanctioned H2Oi Car Rally.

The rally was first held in September 2020, bringing hundreds to the popular beach town. After a chaotic scene, officers spent months preparing for the rally's expected return in 2021.

According to the report, the public work cost for officer overtime is estimated at more than \$46,000.


However, due to the three-year billing model that the OPP operates under, the actual costs associated with the event will be applied to its response to large-scale events of its size province-wide.

"But the reality is this cost the province, every taxpayer, hundreds of thousands of dollars," Mayor Nina Bifolchi said. "When this event happens somewhere else in the province, it's costing us here in Wasaga Beach, so these events as a whole are expensive."

Over the three-day rally weekend, OPP had a total of 488 calls for service.

Officers responded to 11 collisions, laid 399 charges, and had 70 vehicles towed, 22 for stunt driving offences, and 33 were considered unfit for the road.

OPP says officers will be prepared for its potential return in 2022.

'Unacceptable': Wasaga Beach mayor critical of police response to H2Oi event

Mayor says OPP response to unsanctioned car rally not as robust as it should have been

Police laid 191 charges over the weekend in Wasaga Beach, a period during which the town's mayor said the community's safety was repeatedly put at risk.

Mayor Nina Bifolchi said the OPP's response to the H2Oi car rally — an unsanctioned event featuring modified high-performance vehicles — was not as "robust" as was "required to maintain law and order."

"There were many examples brought to the attention of the town where laws were being broken and police intervention was not witnessed. This is unacceptable to the residents of Wasaga Beach," she said in a statement released on Aug. 29.

Central Region OPP spokesperson Gosia Puzio said the OPP does not discuss operational details.

"However, when the OPP becomes aware of any type of incident that may impact public safety, there is a significant amount of planning undertaken to ensure everyone's safety, including participants, the public, and police officers," she said in a statement to *Simcoe.com*.

In a news release issued late on Aug. 29, the OPP reported that officers responded to 327 calls between Aug. 26 and 28. Of the 191 charges laid, 154 were Highway Traffic Act-related, including 37 for speeding, 18 for an improper or no muffler and six for unnecessary noise.

Three motorists were charged with impaired driving.

Two OPP vehicles parked at Beck and Main streets had their windows smashed out; officers, and a police dog, were in the vehicles at the time, but were unharmed. In a video posted by YouTube user Redin IRL, purportedly shot in Wasaga Beach on the weekend, an individual is shown jumping up and down on the hood of a cruiser.

There were also a number of instances of property damage and break-ins to businesses.

"There are numerous active investigations into the incidents that transpired in Wasaga Beach this past weekend, including property damage and break and enters," Puzio said. "The OPP will conduct thorough and exhaustive investigations holding those responsible accountable."

Bifolchi said what took place on the weekend was "not acceptable. The town has no authority over the OPP, but we call on those in authority within the OPP to review what transpired and take steps to ensure that there is never a repeat of what we witnessed."

She added that she had called on Solicitor General Michael Kerzner to "ensure that the OPP are properly equipped and prepared to ensure that Wasaga Beach is not put at risk again."

Municipal officials had met with the OPP prior to the rally, and the OPP had laid out an operations plan to address the event. Bifolchi said town officials had made efforts to reach out to the purported organizers in the past to urge them to go through the town's special events process, but had not received a response.

"I call on the car rally community to consider working with us. An organized and safe gathering is possible here," she said.



Police warn potential attendees to respect community

Police have charged 20 people in connection to an unsanctioned car rally in Wasaga Beach last month.

The event occurred the weekend of Aug 26-28, and the charges include 17 counts of dangerous operation of a vehicle and 20 counts of stunt driving.

In a video posted on Twitter, OPP Acting Sgt. Rob Simpson said those charged range in age from 17-37 and reside across Ontario.

He said the investigation is ongoing and additional charges could be laid.


The announcement came in advance of another H20i rally that is scheduled in Wasaga Beach this weekend.



"With an increase in visitors expected in the town of Wasaga Beach this weekend, members of the public are asked to anticipate an increased police presence, possible traffic delays and road closures," Simpson said.

He said the OPP — which will be joined and supported by the Wasaga Beach Fire Department, County of Simcoe paramedics and the Town of Wasaga Beach bylaw department — will be adopting a "strict but fair" approach.

Simpson warned those visiting the community "to respect our communities and not jeopardize the safety of our citizens and neighbourhoods with risky, illegal and dangerous actions."



Ontario Provincial Police out in full force to address car rally in Wasaga Beach

If anyone had doubts about the Ontario Provincial Police's presence in the Wasaga Beach area on the weekend, one only had to turn to the OPP's social media presence.

On Facebook and Twitter, the OPP posted details of several arrests, including one in which the OPP's helicopter was used to track down a suspected impaired driver on Dunkerron Avenue.

The posts included a litany of drivers pulled over for travelling more than 50 km/h over the posted limit, a charge that results in a loss of driving privileges for 30 days and a 14-day impoundment of the vehicle.

In a news release issued early Saturday (Sept. 24) night, Acting Sergeant Rob Simpson said 136 provincial offence notices were issued for violations related to the Highway Traffic Act, Environmental Protection Act and the Liquor Licence Control Act.

A number of motorists were also investigated and charged for speed, vehicle exhaust systems and equipment-related offences. That included a 28-year-old driver from Maple who was stopped after officers clocked a vehicle travelling at 131 km/h in a 80 km/h zone on Highway 26 near Rainbow Valley Road in Clearview Township around 11:30 p.m. on Sept. 23.

Simpson stated officers found a number of issues with the vehicle, included bald rear tires, an improper muffler, expired plates and no front plate.

The driver was issued an automatic roadside 30-day licence suspension and a court date and the vehicle was impounded for 14 days.

Officers conducted a number of RIDE stops and the local detachment had assistance from officers from other detachments, specialty teams from across the province, Ministry of Transportation enforcement officers, and officers from the York Regional Police Service, South Simcoe Police Service and Barrie Police Service.

As of Saturday night, officers had responded to 39 calls and investigated four vehicle collisions.

Leading up to the weekend, when it was anticipated a second H2Oi pop-up car rally was going to be held in Wasaga Beach, municipal officials and the OPP warned the public there would be a heightened police presence. A similar rally in late August resulted in more than 200 charges,

including those against a London man in connection to two cruisers being damaged. Additionally, leading into this weekend, police announced <u>charges against 20 people for a variety of offences</u> tied to the first rally.

In a video posted to Facebook and Twitter on Saturday afternoon, the detachment's commander, Insp. Leah Gilfoy, thanked the residents of Wasaga Beach for "their patience, support and contributions to community safety.

"You have undoubtedly noticed the heightened police presence this weekend as we continue to work with the town to ensure the safety of everyone," Gilfoy said.



'This behaviour will not be tolerated': 25-year-old London man charged with damage to cruiser during H2Oi event in Wasaga Beach

25-year-old also faces charges for shoplifting

A London, Ont., man faces several charges in connection to damage done to two OPP cruisers during the H2Oi pop-up car rally in Wasaga Beach.

Officers with the Huronia West OPP's Crime Unit, with the assistance of the Provincial Repeat Offender Parole Enforcement Unit, arrested the 25-year-old days after the damage to the cruisers, which took place in the early morning hours of Aug. 28.

Video circulating on social media shows one individual repeatedly jumping up and down on one of the cruisers. Later video shows the cruiser with a smashed front windshield.

Police say that officers and a police dog were inside the vehicle when the windows were smashed, but were unharmed.



The OPP issued a statement advising that officers would conduct a thorough and exhaustive investigation leading to the arrests of these individuals and hold those responsible accountable to the fullest extent of the law.

The Huronia West OPP crime unit have identified one of the suspects from this incident. The investigation will continue to identify the second individual.

The man faces two charges of assaulting a police officer, causing a disturbance, participating in a riot, and mischief over \$5,000. He was also charged with forcible entry, shoplifting (theft under \$5,000), and possession of property obtained by crime.

The accused was brought back to the Huronia West OPP detachment where he was held pending a bail hearing, Sept. 2, at the Ontario Court of Justice in Barrie.

"The safety of our community and our officers is our number 1 priority and the safety of both was jeopardized during this incident," stated a news release from Central Region OPP spokesperson, Acting Sgt. Terri-Ann Pencarinha. "We want to make it clear that this behaviour will not be tolerated. Thank you to the many community members for their support and assistance in this investigation."



Windows smashed on 2 OPP police vehicles during car rally in Wasaga Beach, Ont.

Nina Bifolchi calls on Ontario solicitor general to make sure police 'properly equipped'

Two Ontario Provincial Police vehicles had their windows smashed during a car rally in Wasaga Beach, Ont. on the weekend and the town's mayor is wondering why more police resources weren't available. Mayor Nina Bifolchi said in a statement on Monday that the town was put at risk repeatedly and she would like Ontario Solicitor General Michael Kerzner to make sure that police in the town are "properly equipped."

"The town is very appreciative of the men and women who wear the OPP uniform and patrol our streets, but clearly police resources this past weekend did not allow for the robust response required to maintain law and order," Bifolchi said in the statement.

The OPP said officers were inside the vehicles and one had a police dog when the cruisers were damaged early Sunday.

According to police and videos circulating on social media, there was street racing, stunt driving and vandalism in Wasaga Beach on Saturday night into Sunday morning.

One YouTube video shows a massive street party, people using their iPhones to film drivers doing donuts , tires smoking, cars revving their engines, and one man jumping on the windshield of an OPP cruiser. Bifolchi blamed a group of people who attended the "unsanctioned" car rally for the mayhem.

"There were many examples brought to the attention of the town where laws were being broken and police intervention was not witnessed. This is unacceptable to the residents of Wasaga Beach," Bifolchi's statement said.

'Completely unacceptable'

In an email on Monday, Kerzner said the behaviour during the car rally was "completely unacceptable" and he urged anyone with relevant information to call police.

"The government does not interfere with or direct police operational decisions, including in response to community incidents. However, we will continue to provide police services and community partners with the resources and support they need to combat crime and keep Ontarians safe," Kerzner said in the email.

The OPP's Huronia West Detachment, for its part, said in a news release on Sunday that it responded to "numerous calls for service" on Saturday night into Sunday morning and is investigating property damage at two stores, Canadian Tire on 45th Street, and Walmart on Stonebridge Boulevard, as well as a break-in at the Walmart.

It is also investigating Highway Traffic Act infractions and incidents of mischief. The OPP vehicles were damaged on Beck Street and Main Street, police said.

"The safety of our community and our officers is our number one priority and the safety of both was jeopardized last night. We want to make it clear that this behaviour will not be tolerated," police said in the release.

Nearly 200 tickets issued in relation to Wasaga Beach, Ont., car rally

Const. Martin Hachey, spokesperson for the OPP's Huronia West Detachment, said in an interview on Monday that there was an influx of visitors to the town on the weekend. He said there are now several investigations now taking place. Hachey said police are trying to find the people responsible for damaging the OPP vehicles.

"Thankfully, no injuries to the officers or the canine as well, however, the safety of our officers was compromised."

The OPP are reviewing the videos posted to social media, as well as surveillance video.

"Certainly those responsible will be held accountable for their actions," Hachey said.





Bystanders say Wildwood invaded, police outmanned as H2oi car meet-up turned deadly


The aftermath of what happened Saturday night in Wildwood — <u>at least two were killed</u> <u>following a pop-up car rally in Wildwood</u> — was visible in the city on Sunday.

Tire tracks, perhaps from either speeding or skidding vehicles, were visible at multiple intersections.

New Jersey State Police troopers, Wildwood police officers, and officers from the Cape May Sheriff's Office were patrolling the neighborhood. Occasionally, some cars possibly from the prior night's gathering — were being pulled over.

Anthony Bucolo, owner of the Fountain Motel on Atlantic Avenue — where two people were killed in a multi-car crash — said the police came to the motel to question two people who were staying there and to look at his surveillance camera.

"All it really showed was one of the cars hitting the liquor store," he said.

Gerald J. White, 37, of Pittsburgh, Pa. is facing charges in relation to two deaths he's accused of causing while driving his car. Police say he crashed into a Honda Civic, killing its passenger, Timothy Ogden, 34, of Clayton and killing a pedestrian Lindsay Weakland, 18, of Carlisle, Pa.

Bucolo was critical of the drivers who gathered on Saturday.

"These guys invaded and they wound up taking over the island. They threw them out of Ocean City, Maryland and then they invaded this place. The cops knew they were coming, but they didn't think there would be that many people."

Video from throughout the night shows an escalating scene. During daylight hours, cars cruised along main roads like Rio Grande Avenue and Atlantic Avenue as crowds calmly gathered on the sidewalks, watching the cars rev their engines, sending smoke into the air. But as the night wore on, huge crowds spilled into the streets, shouting and recording as drivers did burnouts and donuts through intersections, and blocked police trying to break up the scene.

Multiple graphic videos from Saturday night also depict a second accident on Rio Grande Avenue. They show a car taking off from a standstill in the far right lane at an intersection and another car in the lane next to it clipping it, causing it to lose control and veer into a golf-cart-style vehicle on the opposite side of the road. At least one passenger from the golf cart is seen unresponsive in the road.

The Wildwood <u>commissioners put out a statement</u> after midnight saying they were "grossly outmanned" and were calling in for additional help from New Jersey State Police and surrounding local departments.

Olivia Galing of Rahway witnessed the fatal crash in front of the Cork and Bottle liquor store on Atlantic Avenue and said police had offers stationed on what seemed like every block. She overheard how White had allegedly hit another car's taillight and fled from police before causing the accident. She said the cops would clear the streets and then leave and the people would come right back. Eventually they put up barricades along Atlantic, she said.

""It was nuts, kids trying to do burnouts and stuff like that," she said. "But there were so many people lined up on the side of the road. Kids were standing in the middle of the street on the yellow lines recording things. So it was gonna happen somebody was gonna get hurt."



Ivaylo Nikolov, manager at McDonald's on West Rio Grande Avenue, was working during the day Saturday and left at 4:30 pm.

He did not witness the crash, but during his shift, he said he saw cars racing outside. Many of the vehicles were parked in the McDonald's parking lot, with some who had been inside the cars exiting and dancing on the roofs. Some women were flashing their breasts, he said.

Nikolov said he told all of his employees to stay inside and put posters up on the doors, notifying the racers that they were not allowed to come inside to loiter.

"They were all over the place during the day, dancing on the hoods of cars. It was crazy. They were racing up and down the street. I've never seen anything like it. It was like that movie, the 'Fast and the Furious,'" Nikolov said, referring to the 2001 movie that centered on street racing and turned in a multi-film franchise.

A worker at one motel, in describing the harrowing scene from Saturday night, recounted even pouring gasoline onto the street. She said she had a difficult time trying to drive away from work around 11 p.m., due to the streets being crowded with people.

Diane Fly, a tourist staying at the Fountain Motel, said she heard a crash, but didn't see what happened.

"We've been coming down here forever. We've never experienced anything like this," Fly said.

Asked about the police response, Fly said, "They did what they could, but when there's thousands of people it's hard for them to control it."

"I'm still coming here. I'm just hoping this never happens again," Fly added.

A liquor store employee at the scene of the fatal crash at Atlantic and Burk avenues described seeing a car going at least 80 mph and striking another vehicle. His store showed apparent signs of one accident, with light damage and pieces of a car's windshield visible near the construction of the new addition in the back of the store.

Wildwood Mayor Pete Byron told NJ Advance Media midday Sunday that it had been a "pretty hectic last 24, 48 hours" and that there were additional injuries involving a golf cart on Rio Grande Avenue that was struck by one of the H20i vehicles.

Multiple videos taken at different angles on Rio Grande Avenue show a car speeding through an intersection before crashing into another vehicle and then losing control and hitting a low-speed vehicle, similar to a golf cart, knocking some of its passengers from the vehicle.

Debbie Davis, who stays in an apartment on Atlantic Avenue during the summer and on weekends, also heard what sounded like a crash.



"I heard it and I thought 'oh my gosh, someone must have gotten hit," Davis said.

"The Wildwood Police did an excellent job on Friday. They blocked off the streets around 11 (p.m.) and made their presence known so that it would calm down and we were just waiting for the same thing to happen Saturday night, but unfortunately this had happened already," Davis said.

Saturday's crowd wasn't the first. Hundreds of people also showed up at Lowe's parking lot in Middle Township on Friday night. Mayor Tim Donahue said in a statement that after that gathering, the township was prepared on Saturday by putting police at key parking lots in the 72-square-mile town until 4 a.m. However, it's unclear if any of the crowds appeared in Middle Township on Saturday.

In addition to the New Jersey State Police and police from Wildwood's three departments, units from Cape May, Atlantic City and Ocean City responded to calls Saturday night, authorities said.



Driver who slammed into family in golf cart during Wildwood H2oi car rally faces assault charges

A Linden man has been charged after driving into a golf cart and seriously injuring one person during the <u>deadly H2oi car meet-up</u> in Wildwood over the weekend, court records show.

Eryk R. Wnek, 22, is charged with aggravated assault and assault by auto after striking a golf cart occupied by two adults and four juveniles, records obtained by NJ Advance Media show.

Wnek was in town for the H2oi car rally, an event originally intended to celebrate watercooled Volkswagens and Audis, but which in recent years has devolved into "takeovers" of city streets, culminating in a deadly crash in Wildwood Saturday night <u>for which</u> <u>another driver is charged</u>.

Wnek is accused of crashing his BMW into another car on Rio Grande Avenue on Saturday, spinning out, and slamming into the golf cart, records show.

One of the occupants of the golf cart, a man, was airlifted to a trauma center in Atlantic City with serious injuries, documents show. His girlfriend and four children were also on the cart. A <u>GoFundMe page</u> says they sustained only bruising.

Wnek will have his first appearance before a state Superior Court judge in Cape May County on Tuesday afternoon, a court officials said, where prosecutors will look to keep him detained ahead of a trial. A detention hearing is expected to be scheduled for later.

"We feel this was a tragic multi vehicle accident that presents a causation issue because our client's car was hit by an unknown black sedan," said attorney Joel Juffe, who is representing Wnek with Louis Barbone of Jacobs & Barbone.

Juffe said the other car is still at large.

A spokeswoman for the prosecutor's office said she could not confirm that information at this time.





Driver charged in fatal H2oi wreck was fleeing another accident before crash that killed 2, cops say

The driver <u>charged with killing two people</u> during H2oi, an out-of-control car meet-up in Wildwood that drew more than 500 cars, was fleeing a first crash on Saturday when he was involved in a second crash that killed two, according to court documents.

Gerald J. White, 37, is charged with leaving the scene of an accident that caused death and serious bodily injuries, two counts of assault by auto, two counts of death by auto, and fleeing the scene of a crash, charging documents obtained by NJ Advance Media show.

White is currently being held in the Cape May County jail ahead of a detention hearing set for Wednesday, where prosecutors will argue White should be kept in jail as the charges against him are pending.

He appeared virtually before a judge Monday afternoon for a four-minute first appearance. The charges were not read, and a public defender has not yet been assigned.

White said that although he is listed as being from Pittsburgh, he is currently living in Delaware.

White was in Wildwood Saturday night for an H2oi car rally, a meet-up originally intended for Audi and Volkswagen owners to show off modified engines and custom paint jobs but has since become a self-organized pop-up event derided by officials in other beach towns for being disorganized and dangerous.

The Wildwood meet-up quickly spiraled out of control, devolving into mass chaos of more than 500 cars that led to two deaths and a number of serious injuries, records and interviews with witnesses and officials show.

According to charging documents, White first crashed on the 4000 block of Atlantic Avenue and fled when cops tried to intervene.

Police were soon after called to the 4600 block of Atlantic Avenue for the multipedestrian, multi-car crash, only to find that White had fled again, police said. He was arrested in the area shortly after, police say.

The second crash killed Timothy Ogden, a passenger in the car White is accused of hitting, and Lindsay Weakland, a one of two pedestrians he is accused of striking.

The driver of the car Ogden was in and the second pedestrian were taken to hospitals for their injuries, the charging document states.

Additional charges could still be filed against White, Cape May County prosecutors said in a statement on Sunday.



"With police on overtime and getting town and county employees working overtime, it's an added cost to the tax base that takes money away from other important things that we have to do," he said, adding the exact cost won't be known until later.

"It won't be \$10,000 or \$20,000. It will be a heck of a lot more than that. Poor Wasaga Beach has been hit four times (by these revelers) and the cost there is staggering."

Huron County OPP and Goderich's acting mayor issued stern warnings to would-be revelers last week in the lead-up to the anticipated rally on Sept. 24 and 25, but the rumoured event didn't happen.

The spectre of the unauthorized event also drew sharp criticism from local politicians and business owners.

OPP increased their presence in the town of 8,000 people last weekend and stepped up patrols starting on the Friday evening. Officers did not encounter any suspected car rally participants, as rain and grey skies blanketed the region.

With officers preparing for potential problems this weekend, the public should be aware of traffic disruptions and possible property damage, police say.

"We really hope that, through our enhanced media that we have been getting out there this week, it's sending a strong message to this group. If they intend to come to Goderich then they are going to have

to expect a heavy police presence," Huron County OPP Const. Jamie Stanley said Friday.

"We will make it difficult for them if they are not going to abide by the rules."

By Friday evening, police had blocked vehicle access to Courthouse Square from Kingston Street and West Street as a "proactive measure" to ensure community safety, Huron OPP said in a statement. "Motorists should be advised physical barriers will be in place preventing vehicular access onto Courthouse Square from all other roadways," police said.

Participants at the unsanctioned event in Wasaga Beach engaged in various "illegal acts," including dangerous driving, impaired driving and breaking and entering, police said.

"We really don't want to get into the situation that took place in Wasaga Beach where there was destruction of property and individuals jumping on police cruisers. It is certainly concerning," Stanley said.

The rumoured rally comes as Environment Canada is calling for a picture-perfect fall weekend in Goderich and Southwestern Ontario, with cloud-free skies and temperatures hovering around 18 C, seasonal for this time of year.

In a bylaw coming to council on Aug. 24, the municipality will create a tiered response it can use in advance of an illegal rally, along with the designation of the roads within the beachfront and downtown as a community safety zone.

"Illegal events, and illegal car rallies organized by people that do not have permits and do not respect the law, are not welcome in Wasaga Beach," Mayor Brian Smith said. "They threaten the safety of our residents, visitors and local businesses ... they risk people's lives."

Since 2020, Wasaga Beach has become the destination for H2Oi, a so-called "pop-up" car rally featuring heavily-modified high performance vehicles that in some instances, would not be considered street legal.

There is also an element of these gatherings that include drivers taking part in unsafe driving activities, such as drifting, burnouts, and doughnuts. Over the last three years during these gatherings, the OPP has issued hundreds of charges and seized dozens of vehicles.

Earlier this year, the town implemented a "strict-is-fair" approach targeting individuals engaging in "nuisance" behaviours — such as noise, public intoxication, and large unruly gatherings.

In July, council approved a bylaw that would bar an individual from planning, advertising and hosting a rally without the town's permission.

At its Aug. 10 meeting, following its closed-door session, council approved a motion to spend \$23,000 on signs to implement a community safety zone, and have staff develop a bylaw.

There was no discussion on the motion.

On Aug. 17, municipal officials stated the designation of the zone includes the adoption of a framework that includes full-scale road closures and a three-tier emergency response system in co-ordination with the OPP.

The lowest tier would involve activating an incident management team and grant the town authority under the Municipal Act to issue cease-and-desist orders to organizers of illegal car rallies — with the intent to pursue the maximum penalty of \$25,000 in all cases.

At the next tier, when there is considered a high level of risk to public safety, or an illegal event is imminent, the response could include vehicle inspection stations at the town's main access points operated by the OPP and Ministry of Transportation; road closures that would see main access points limited to local traffic only; traffic diversion zones; specific town properties activated as vehicle impound lots, with towing and impound fees in effect; parking lot closures; and Beach Drive open to pedestrians only.

At the highest tier, or highest level of risk to public safety, the response would include an increased OPP presence, and a containment strategy with additional road closures and traffic diversion zones in effect.

Fire chief Craig Williams said the framework "allows us to use a number of tools, including community safety zones, road closures, and collaboration between ourselves and community partners so that in the event an illegal car rally does come to town, we're able to ideally prevent their entrance ... and manage any cars that do come to town."

It will also assist first responders who could find themselves in danger at these events.

"It will help protect our teams while we help ensure the safety of residents and visitors," he said.

Williams said the community safety zones, which would see fines doubled for traffic infractions such as speeding and stunt driving, would be an effective tool during an illegal car rally, and also promote safety for the rest of the year.

The new policy was welcomed by Canadian Tire franchise owner Ken Voss, whose parking lot was taken over by H2Oi participants in 2022, causing thousands of dollars in damages.

"We support the town and council in taking this proactive, co-ordinated approach to dealing with illegal car rallies," Voss said. "These large nuisance events damage private property, threaten the safety of our customers and local residents, and are completely unnecessary."






THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF WASAGA BEACH

BY-LAW NO. 2018-99

A By-law to regulate Special Events in the Town of Wasaga Beach

WHEREAS pursuant to section 9 of the *Municipal Act, 2001* S.O. 2001, c. 25, a municipality has the capacity, rights, powers and privileges of a natural person for the purpose of exercising its authority under this or any other Act;

AND WHEREAS pursuant to subsection 8(1) of the *Municipal Act*, 2001, the powers of a municipality under this or any other Act shall be interpreted broadly so as to confer broad authority on the municipality to enable the municipality to govern its affairs as it considers appropriate to enhance the municipality's ability to respond to municipal issues;

AND WHEREAS pursuant to section 107 of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, Council may provide grants to such persons groups or bodies for any purpose that Council considers to be in the interests of the Town;

AND WHEREAS pursuant to section 126 of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, Council may pass by-laws to regulate cultural and recreational events, including public fairs and pursuant to section 129 of the *Municipal Act, 2001* may pass by-laws to regulate and prohibit noise, vibration, odour, dust and outdoor illumination;

AND WHEREAS pursuant to Part XIV of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, Council may pass bylaws providing that a person who contravenes a by-law is guilty of an offence, to establish fines for offences under its by-laws and generally to enforce its by-laws;

AND WHEREAS section 23.1 of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, authorizes a municipality to delegate legislative and quasi-judicial powers to an individual who is an officer, employee or agent of the municipality provided the delegation is of a minor nature, considering the number of people, the size of the geographic area and the time period effect by the exercise of the power and any other factors that the Council considers appropriate;

AND WHEREAS the Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach wishes to encourage the holding of special events in the Town and deems it advisable to replace the Special Events Policy and Guidelines passed under By-law 2016-03 with a new by-law to govern the holding of special events on public property and with respect to the provision of grants to assist with the holding of special events;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach HEREBY ENACTS THAT this By-law shall come into force and take effect on the date of its final passing.

1. DEFINITIONS

- 1.1 In this By-law:
 - (a) **"Advertising and Promotion Plan"** means a written outline detailing the proposed advertising, promotional and marketing campaign regarding the Special Event;
 - (b) "AGCO" means the Alcohol & Gaming Commission of Ontario;
 - (c) **"Applicant"** means the person or entity submitting, filing or making an application for a Permit;
 - (d) **"Board"** means the Beachfront Management Board, being the designated authority over the Town-operated beachfront area;
 - (e) "Clerk" means the Town Clerk of the Town of Wasaga Beach or his or her delegate;
 - (f) **"Committee"** means the Community Services Section of Coordinated Committee being a committee of Council;
 - (g) **"Community Event"** means a locally-organized and operated Special Event that is aimed or focused towards local residents;
 - (h) "Community Impact/Communication Plan" means a plan to inform and where appropriate solicit public feedback and involvement regarding managing the impacts associated with a special event and to optimize the benefits for the community;
 - (i) **"Council"** means the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach;
 - (j) **"Director"** means the Director of Recreation, Events & Facilities of the Town or their designate;
 - (k) "Emergency Plan" means a written plan to follow in the event of fire, extreme weather, criminal acts, personal injuries, medical or other emergencies, a description of all first aid services to be provided, medical transport provisions a communication protocol, decision making;
 - (I) "Fire Safety Plan" means a written plan to addressing fire protection and prevention procedures or safeguards to react to situations involving fire and fire hazards;
 - (m) "Grant" means a grant for a Special Event;

- (n) **"Operations Plan"** means a consolidated document outlining all applicable aspects of event plans and controls as specifically outlined in Section 3.4;
- (o) "OPP" means Ontario Provincial Police;
- (p) **"Permit"** means any permit issued in accordance with the provision of this By-law;
- (q) **"Permit Holder**" means the event organizer or entity ultimately responsible for the organization and operations of the Special Event;
- (r) "Person" shall include a corporation, business entity or group;
- (s) "Private Property" means any lands or facilities that are not owned or operated by the Town;
- (t) "Security Plan" means a written plan that establishes measures to ensure the safety, protection and precaution with respect to persons and property at, travelling to and from or in the vicinity of the Special Events. It provides information relating to all security services dedicated to the Special Event, their roles and responsibilities, a communication protocol, decision making authority, restricted areas and any other security information that the Fire Chief or the Detachment Commander, Huronia West OPP or their designates may require;
- (u) **"Site"** means the real property and premises at which a Special Event takes place;
- (v) "Site Plan" means a drawing or sketch of the subject area indicating the details of the event that shall include but not limited to booths, entrances/exits and any other structure that is to be accompanied by a map displaying the size and location of the Special Event;
- (w) **"Special Event"** means an exhibition, event, or function held within the Town as set out in Section 2.1 of this By-law and includes both a Community Event and a Tourism Event;
- (x) "Structural Plan" means a plan or drawing that sets out the location and particulars of any buildings or structures that are being erected, constructed or otherwise provided, whether permanent or temporary, on the subject area of the Special Event and will include a lighting plan, if the Special Event is proposed to take place during non-daylight hours, that will minimize the impact or interference of illumination upon properties in the vicinity of the Special Event;
- (bb) **"Tourism Event"** means an event that is aimed or focused geared towards persons located at least 40 kilometres from the boundaries of the Town;

- (cc) "Town" means the Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach;
- (dd) "Town Departments" means any departments within the Town;
- (aa) **"Traffic Management Plan"** means a plan providing for the control and management of traffic and parking including all vehicular, pedestrian, and cyclist movements to, from, and within the Site and, where applicable,
 - (i) detours of public transit routes and highways,
 - (ii) emergency vehicle access and egress,
 - (iii) pedestrian flow,
 - (iv) temporary barriers and devices necessary for traffic control or parking,
 - (v) designated accessible pick-up and drop-off locations for persons with disabilities,
 - (vi) the pick-up and drop-off locations for buses, taxis, shuttles, and limousines,
 - (vii) vehicles that exceed the load or dimension limits set out in Parts VII and VIII of the *Highway Traffic Act,* R.S.O. 1990, c. H.8, and
 - (viii) such other traffic and parking information as the Director, Public Works may require.
- (ee) **"Waste Management Plan"** means a plan outlining the management of waste, recycling, septate and hazards, pre-event, during the event and post event.

2. SPECIAL EVENTS FOR WHICH PERMIT REQUIRED

- 2.1 No Person shall hold, organize or sponsor any of the following events or activities on Town Property or other public facilities or the following events or activities on Private Property which attract more than 500 people at any given time who participate or attend (collectively, "Special Events"), unless the Town has issued a Permit for the Special Event for such period of time as set out in the Permit:
 - parades, processions, marathons, bicycle races and other events utilizing the sidewalks or vehicular travel portion of municipal streets, highways, parking lots or properties including facilities operated by the Town or within the boundaries of the Wasaga Beach Provincial Park;

- (b) carnivals, bazaars and similar events which offer such activities as amusement rides or devices, games of skill, animal rides or exhibitions, food concessions or live entertainment;
- (c) outdoor festivals offering live or recorded music or entertainment for public or private audiences;
- (d) organized scheduled contests and exhibitions;
- (e) marine events, including any prescheduled organized concentration of watercraft, involving participants and/or spectators, of a competitive or non-competitive nature;
- (f) scheduled races, exhibitions or other events involving the operation of motorized vehicles of any type;
- (g) activities or events requiring a variance from the regulations of any municipal department;
- (h) outdoor assemblies for demonstration, political, religious and/or cultural purposes; or
- (i) the showing of feature films, television commercials, documentaries, educational films, television films, television network programs, music videos and commercial still photography.
- 2.2 Despite Section 2.1, a Permit shall not be required for any Special Event which takes place solely and exclusively on Private Property if the Special Event is permitted in the Town's zoning by-laws or has otherwise been authorized by the Town as either:
 - (a) being part of the normal operations of a business or institution (except for those facilities set out in Section 2.2(b)), and will not reasonably:
 - (i) have the potential to strain the community's emergency services response,
 - (ii) have a foreseeable impact on the regular flow of traffic,
 - (iii) adversely affect the Wasaga Beach community,
 - (iv) present an elevated risk to the health and safety of participants or general public;
 - or
 - (b) takes place at RecPlex, Oakview Woods, Wasaga Stars Arena or the Sports Park in the normal course of events at the aforementioned facilities and, if

not, the Director may exercise his or her sole and absolution discretion to require a Permit, which decision shall be final and binding.

3. APPLICATIONS

- 3.1 An application for a Permit for a Special Event shall be submitted to the Town in accordance with the following deadlines:
 - (a) for a Community Event lasting one (1) day or less, not requiring the approval or assistance of the external agencies and held on Town Property, at least sixty (60) days prior to Community Event;
 - (b) for a Community Event or Tourism Event lasting two (2) or more days, not requiring the approval or assistance of the external agencies and held on Town Property, at least ninety (90) days prior to the first day of the Special Event;
 - (c) for a Tourism Event lasting one day or more and held on Ontario Parks Property (i.e. Beach Area 1) and/or having AGCO or OPP requirements (such as a beer garden), and having an economic benefit to the Town, at least one hundred and eighty (180) days prior to the Tourism Event; and
 - (d) for a Community or Tourism Event that occurs on an annual basis and held on Ontario Parks Property (i.e. Beach Area 1) and/or having AGCO or OPP requirements (such as a beer garden), and having an economic benefit to the Town, at least ninety (90) days prior to the first day of the Special Event.
- 3.2 Application forms can be obtained from the Recreation, Events & Facilities department Special Event Office or via the Town's Website.
- 3.3 Nothing in this By-law shall preclude or restrict Council from granting a multi-year Permit for a Special Event subject to such conditions as Council considers appropriate and subject to all required external agency approvals being secured, issued or obtained. Council shall consider the previous performance of the Special Event, whether it complied with all requirements and whether all invoices to external agents, contractors and suppliers were paid in full.
- 3.4 Every application for a Permit shall include an Operations Plan which is to be submitted a minimum of sixty (60) days prior to the Special Event (flexibility will be given in circumstances where notice could not have been reasonably provided within this time frame), consisting of:
 - (a) Site Plan showing:
 - (i) the boundaries of the Site on which the Special Event will be held;

- (ii) the location of all existing and proposed buildings or structures to be used in connection with the Special Event and any accommodation and/or residential building on adjacent properties,
- (iii) all areas to be designated for food and beverage sales or consumption,
- (iv) all areas to be designated for vehicle parking and camping, and
- (v) all proposed access locations around the Site's perimeter.
- (b) details of the Special Event including (where applicable):
 - (i) food and beverages plan including plans for alcohol service and provision of potable water,
 - (ii) Advertising and Promotion Plan for events on Town Property,
 - (iii) Structural Plan structures, temporary structures, stages, lighting and tents larger than 60m²,
 - (iv) Fire Safety Plan (including pyrotechnic/fireworks),
 - (v) Emergency Plan,
 - (vi) Security Plan,
 - (vii) Traffic Management Plan,
 - (viii) Waste Management Plan, including provision of lavatory facilities,
 - (ix) Community Impact/Communication Plan,
 - (x) the proposed use of:
 - (1) generators, propane appliance and any other specialized equipment to be used during the Special Event, include the type of fuel used to operate the equipment,
 - (2) use of exotic pets/animals,
 - (3) sound equipment,
 - (4) vehicles that exceed the load or dimension limits set out in Parts VII and VIII of the *Highway Traffic Act*, helicopters, hot air balloons, aircraft, trains, or watercraft,

- (5) use of drones for photography or other purposes where federal regulations and permits are required,
- (6) amusement devices, and
- (7) signs for marketing, promotion and communication of proposed closures and detours.
- 3.5 The Applicant shall provide:
 - (a) proof that it is the registered owner of the Site on which the Special Event is to be held or written consent from the registered owner for the Special Event;
 - (b) if an individual, proof that the Applicant is at least 18 years of age,
 - (c) if a corporation, copies of the letters of incorporation or other incorporating documents that have been duly certified by the proper authorities and that show the full corporate name, officers, and directors of the Applicant; and
 - (d) any information or documentation that the Director deems necessary.
- 3.6 A completed application shall be processed and either issued or denied within a reasonable time of receipt. Dependant on the location of the Special Event, the Applicant may be required to attend a pre-scheduled meeting to discuss the Special Event with the Board or Committee. If the Committee recommends approving the Special Event and the request for a Grant, if required, it will proceed to Council for final approval. If the Special Event takes place within the Board's jurisdiction, the Board has the final approval authority. If a Permit for a Special Event is denied, such decision will be in writing, setting forth the reasons for denial.
- 3.7 If an application is submitted after the filing deadline set forth in Section 3.1, the Senior Special Event Coordinator or the Director in his/her discretion, upon receipt of a written submission outlining the reasons why the said time limits could not be met, amend the time limits set out in Section 3.1.
- 3.8 If a Grant is being requested, the amount is to be included along with a detailed budget showing how the funds will be spent and the benefit to the Town (Grants must be requested by August 31st the year prior to the event).
- 3.9 The Applicant is responsible to pay for any fees and charges relating to the Special Event in accordance with Schedule "H" of the Town's Consolidated Rates and Fees By-law as updated and amended from time to time. The Town reserves the right to waive any fee or charge.
- 3.10 Where deemed appropriate by the Board, Committee or Council, as the case may be, the Permit Holder shall provide security either in cash or a letter of credit in a form acceptable to the Director, Finance as security for possible damage to Town

Property (including highways) or equipment for possible damage to public or private properties potentially impacted by the event; for any monies paid or owing by the Town for any costs incurred by the Town as a result of the Permit Holder's use of the Site (including but not limited to emergency service costs, policing costs, road maintenance costs, and clean-up costs); and for fulfillment of all the Permit Holder's obligations under the By-law and Permit.

3.11 In addition to any other action or remedy the Town may take under this By-law, where the Permit Holder fails to or refuses to, provide the security required by Section 3.10, the Permit Holder shall reimburse/compensate the Town for any costs or damages whatsoever that the Town incurs as a result of the Special Event(s), including any remedial action that the Town, in its discretion, may be required to undertake pursuant to section 446 of the *Municipal Act*, 2001.

4. PERMIT APPROVAL PROCESS

- 4.1 Approval for a Special Event may be issued upon receipt and review of an application for a Permit if the following conditions have been met:
 - (a) there is a demonstrated benefit to the businesses, residents and visitors of the Town by approving the Special Event;
 - (b) any proposed use of public property, right of way, or facilities will not unreasonably interfere with the normal use of the property, right of way or facility by the municipality or general public;
 - (c) the proposed activity does not present a safety or health risk to participants, spectators or the public;
 - (d) the proposed activity is compatible with the surrounding area or neighbourhood: giving consideration to acceptable increases in noise, traffic, crowd and other municipal concerns;
 - (e) every Applicant shall provide proof of commercial general liability insurance for itself, its affiliates, and any and all subsidiaries, acceptable to the Director and the Director, Finance and subject to limits of not less than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00) inclusive per occurrence for bodily injury, death and damage to property including loss of use thereof, for the duration of the Special Event unless the Special Event involves the use and or sale of alcohol, wherein the amount of insurance required is not less than Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000.00) (Applicants should refer to the Town's Alcohol Policy for details about the use/sale/consumption of alcohol on Town Property and within Town operated facilities);
 - (f) if deemed necessary by the Director, the Applicant shall provide liability insurance in respect of licensed, owned or leased motor vehicles subject to a limit of not less than Two Million Dollars inclusive per occurrence for bodily injury, death and damage to property including loss of use thereof;

- (g) if deemed necessary by the Director, the insurance shall include additional coverage as deemed to be appropriate;
- (h) all insurance shall be in the name of the Permit Holder and shall name the Town as additional insured with a cross liability endorsement and severability of interests' provision. This insurance shall be non-contributing with, and apply as primary and not as excess of, any insurance available to the Town;
- (i) all insurance shall contain the endorsement to provide the Town with thirty
 (30) days prior written notice of any cancellation or change;
- the Director may vary at his/her sole discretion the monetary limits to a maximum of \$10,000,000 coverage as set out in Section 5.1(a) to mitigate risks to the Town and the community;
- (k) municipal resources necessary to support the proposed activity are available; and
- (I) all comments/recommendations from pertinent municipal operating departments, the MNRF – Wasaga Beach Provincial Park, Huronia West OPP, Simcoe County Paramedic Service, Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit, have been received and are in favour of the event or any concerns of the above have been met to the satisfaction of the Board, Committee or Council.

5. PERMIT REQUIREMENTS

- 5.1 The Board, Committee or Council may impose, as conditions to issuing a Permit, such further requirements and restrictions as will, in the sole discretion of the Board and/or Committee, protect the public health, safety, and welfare. These decisions will be based on the recommendations of Town staff, Huronia West O.P.P, Simcoe County Paramedic Service, MNRF Wasaga Beach Provincial Park, Wasaga Beach Fire Department and Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit. Such conditions may include, but are not limited to:
 - (a) the payment of a fee or charge for the use or allocation of Town Property and equipment, in accordance with Schedule "H" of the Consolidated Rates and Fees By-law as amended from time to time; and the posting of security that is satisfactory to the Town up to ninety (90) days after the conclusion of the Special Event;
 - (b) the provision of adequate crowd control and traffic control, security, fire protection, food handling, waste and refuse disposal, and noise restrictions;
 - (c) permission to use land wholly or partly within the boundaries of Wasaga Beach Provincial Park;

(d) consenting to and/or supplying the Town with a criminal record check.

6. CONDITIONS

- 6.1 In addition to any other conditions that the Board, Committee or Council (or otherwise staff as outlined in the Delegation of Powers and Duties Policy) may deem appropriate, every Permit shall also be subject to the following conditions:
 - (a) the Permit Holder shall comply at all times with:
 - (i) all applicable laws, including any applicable zoning or other land use control by-law under the *Planning Act*,
 - (ii) any approved Emergency Plan, Fire Safety Plan, Security Plan and Traffic Management Plan and Operations Plan, and
 - (iii) the Town's Noise Nuisance By-Law #2016-97 Appendix A prohibitions by time and place, except where the appropriate exemption has been approved and identified in the Operations Plan;
 - (b) the Permit Holder must agree in writing to:
 - (i) save, defend and keep completely harmless and fully indemnify the Town and each of its elected officials, officers, employees, volunteers, sponsors and agents of, from and demands which may be brought against or made upon the Town, its elected officials, officers, employees, volunteers and agents or any of them and of, from and against all loss, costs, charges, damages, liens and expenses which may be sustained, incurred or paid by the Town, its elected officials, officers, employees, volunteers and agents or any of them, by reason of, or on account of, or in consequence of the use of the Site by the Permit Holder and its invitees, guests or users for at the Special Event,
 - (ii) pay to the Town and to each such elected official, officer, employee, volunteer or agent on demand any loss, costs, damages and expenses which may be sustained, incurred or paid by the Town or by any of its elected officials, officers, employees, volunteers, sponsors and agents in consequence of any such action, suit, claim, lien, execution or demand and any monies paid or payable by the Town or any of its elected officials, officers, employees, volunteers, or agents in settlement of or in discharge or on account thereof,
 - (iii) release the Town and each of its elected officials, officers, employees, volunteers, sponsors and agents of, from and against all manner of actions, suits, claims, executions and demands which could be brought against or made upon the Town, its elected officials, officers, employees, volunteers and agents or any of them and of,

from and against all loss, costs, charges, damages, liens and expenses which may be sustained, incurred or paid by the Permit Holder by reason of, or on account of, or in consequence of the use of the Site by the Permit Holder and its invitees, guests or users for the Event, provided, however, that such release shall not apply to any loss, costs, charges, damages, liens and expenses incurred by the Permit Holder arising directly from the gross negligence and/or willful misconduct of the Town, its officers, employees, agents, volunteers or agents;

- (c) the Permit Holder shall:
 - (i) maintain the Site in a clean and sanitary condition for the duration of the Special Event,
 - (ii) remove all debris from the Site and, where required, any adjacent properties within seventy-two (72) hours of the conclusion of the Special Event, and
 - (iii) not use the Town's corporate logo, wordmark or crest in any marketing material advertising the Special Event without the prior approval of the Town; and
- (d) the Permit Holder acknowledges and agrees that should there be a perceived emergency during the course of any Special Event, the Fire Chief and/or the OPP Incident Commander, shall have the absolute and unfettered authority to shut down the Special Event at their sole discretion.

7. GRANT REQUESTS

- 7.1 Council establishes a budget for grants as part of its Annual Operating Budget. Applications for grant funding must be received at the time of the application. The Special Events Department will evaluate applications and a recommendation made to the Board or Council. The factors that the Board or Committee will use to evaluate requests for Grants include:
 - (a) need;
 - (b) amount requested;
 - (c) economic spin-off to the Town from the event;
 - (d) reason for the request;
 - (e) profit versus not-for-profit event;
 - (f) review of proposed budget for event;

- (g) if a returning Special Event, past performance of event including review of previous year's financial statement; and
- (h) potential for the Special Event to become partially or fully self-sufficient.

8. STAFF SUPPORT

8.1 The Senior Special Event Coordinator will be the main contact for Special Events in the Town. This position will provide support to Special Events as authorized by Council and will coordinate the support of other Town Departments as approved by Council. Holders of permits involving property owned by Ontario Parks will have to coordinate activities with Parks staff, with the assistance of a Special Event Coordinator, if required.

9. OTHER REQUIREMENTS

9.1 The issuing of any Permit under this By-law shall not derogate from any requirement of any Person to obtain any business licence or any other permit(s) which may be required by any other Town by-laws, rules and regulations or any other governmental agencies.

10. COMPLIANCE AND REFUSAL

- 10.1 Any Permit issued for a Special Event must be visibly posted at the Site for the duration of the Special Event, including the set up and take down.
- 10.2 Without limited the generality of Section 6, the Board, Committee or Council (or otherwise staff as outlined in the Delegation of Powers and Duties Policy) may refuse to issue a Permit if:
 - the Applicant has not provided information or documentation under Section
 6 or within a satisfactory timeframe to realistically plan and coordinate the
 Special Event;
 - (b) the Applicant has not satisfied the requirements of Section 6;
 - (c) the Applicant has knowingly submitted false, mistaken, incorrect or misleading information in support of the application;
 - (d) there is reason to believe that the carrying on of the Special Event may result in a breach of an applicable law;
 - (e) there are property taxes owing to the Town for the Site on which the Special Event is to be held.

11. REVOCATION

- 11.1 The Board or Council may revoke a Permit at any time without prior notice to the Permit Holder, if:
 - (a) the Permit was issued in error;
 - (b) the Permit was issued as a result of false, mistaken, incorrect or misleading information that was knowingly submitted by the Applicant;
 - (c) the Permit Holder is not in compliance with any license, permit, approval or authorization required under Section 6;
 - (d) the Permit Holder fails to comply with any of the provisions of this By-law, the provisions of the Permit or any other by-laws of the Town;
 - (e) the Permit Holder fails to comply with any condition of the Permit.
- 11.2 If a Permit is revoked under Section 12, the Director shall notify the Permit Holder of the reasons for revocation by reference to the contact information provided in the application for the Permit and inform all affected agencies.

12. RECONSIDERATION

12.1 If an application for a Permit under this By-Law is denied, the application may be subsequently reconsidered once in a calendar year by the Applicant addressing, to the satisfaction of the Board, Committee or Council, the reasons given for the initial denial of the application.

13. ENFORCEMENT

- 13.1 This By-law may be enforced by a Police Officer, a Municipal Law Enforcement Officer or the Fire Chief.
- 13.2 No Person shall prevent, hinder or obstruct or attempt to prevent, hinder or obstruct with an inspection undertaking in accordance with this By-law.
- 13.3 Any Person, who contravenes any provision of this By-law, including any condition of a Permit issued under this By-law, is guilty of an offence and upon conviction is liable to:
 - (a) a minimum fine of \$250 and a maximum fine of \$50,000 for each offence;
 - (b) if the Person is a corporation, a minimum fine of \$500 and a maximum fine of \$100,000 for each offence; and
 - (c) in the case of a continuing offence, such as where the contravention takes place over multiple days, for each day or part of a day that the offence

continues, an additional fine of up to \$10,000 for each day or part of the day that the offence continues.

- 13.4 In addition to the fines set out in Section 13.3 and in order to eliminate or reduce any economic advantage or gain from contravening this By-law, every Person, including a corporation, found guilty of an offence may be liable to a special fine of up to \$250,000.
- 13.5 Where a Person is convicted of an offence for contravening this By-law, the court in which the conviction has been entered, and any court of competent jurisdiction thereafter, may make an order prohibiting the continuation or repetition of the offence by the Person convicted.
- 13.6 Where a Person is convicted of an offence for contravening this By-law, the court in which the conviction has been entered, and any court of competent jurisdiction thereafter, may order the Person to rehabilitate and rectify any land that has been disturbed to its original state and condition.
- 13.7 The system of fines set out in this By-law expressly do not apply to any land use planning or zoning by-law contraventions, including a breach of any conditions of the Permit related to same, that may be prosecuted under section 67 of the *Planning Act.*
- 13.8 Notwithstanding and in addition to the foregoing fines, any Permit issued under this By-law, including conditions attached thereto, may include administrative penalties as contemplated under s. 151(1)(g) of the *Municipal Act, 2001*.

14. GENERAL

- 14.1 Every Permit shall specify the name of the Permit Holder, and the nature, location, date(s) and time(s) of the Special Event.
- 14.2 The issuance of a Permit does not represent a commitment by the Town to issue a Permit for any subsequent, continuing or similar event.
- 14.3 Permits under this By-law are not transferrable.
- 14.4 No amendment shall be made to a Permit without prior authorization by the Director.
- 14.5 If a court of competent jurisdiction declares to be invalid, unenforceable, illegal or beyond the powers of Council to enact, any provisions or parts of any provisions of this By-law, it is the intention of Council in enacting this By-law that the remainder of this By-law shall be deemed to be separate and independent therefrom and that the remainder of this By-law shall continue in force and be applied and enforced in accordance with its terms to the fullest extent possible according to law.

- 14.6 Any reference to statute, regulation or other legislation in this By-law shall include such statue, regulation or other legislation or provision thereof as amended, revised, re-enacted and/or consolidated from time to time and any successor legislation thereto.
- 14.7 The terms in this By-law shall be construed with all changes in number and gender as may be required by the context.
- 14.8 In the event of any conflict between any provisions of this By-law and any other by-law enacted by the Town, the provisions of this By-law shall prevail.

15. SHORT TITLE

15.1 The short title of this By-law shall be the "Special Events By-law."

16. REPEAL

16.1 By-law No. 2016-03 is hereby repealed in its entirety.

17. EFFECTIVE DATE

17.1 This By-law shall be come in force and effect on the date that it is passed.



Explanatory Note

То

By-Law No. 2019-15 Noise & Nuisance

The purpose of the bylaw is to amend one section of By-Law No. 2016-97 being a by-law to control noise and nuisance within the Municipality.

In the penalties section of the noted by-law, it is stated that the minimum fine for an offence is \$500. It is unlikely that a fine of this amount would be approved by the Crown Law Office for the set fines of offences under each by-law.

By having the penalty section restricted to a minimum fine of \$500, it restricts officer's ability to issue a Provincial Offences Notice (ticket with a set fine). Instead, if the situation is of high enough severity that would normally result in a Provincial Offences Notice being issued, officers have to resort to issuing a summons to court. The court process can be avoided by obtaining set fines that are approved by the Crown Law Office, which will not likely be approved with the minimum fine being \$500.

During the Coordinated Committee meeting on February 7, 2019 staff noted the need to add New Years Eve and New Years Day as "approved fireworks days" and have incorporated this additional change for efficiency.

BY-LAW NO 2019-15

A By-law to control Noise and Nuisance within the Municipality and to repeal By-law 2016-97

WHEREAS Section 8 of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, as amended provides that the powers of a municipality under this or any other Act shall be interpreted broadly so as to confer broad authority on the municipality to enable the municipality to govern its affairs as it considers appropriate and to enhance the municipality's ability to respond to municipal issues;

AND WHEREAS Section 9 of the *Municipal Act, 2001,* as amended, grants municipalities the capacity, rights, power and privileges of a natural person for the purpose of exercising its authority under the Act;

WHEREAS Section 11(2) of the Municipal Act permits a municipality to pass by-laws respecting the public assets of the municipality, the economic, social and environmental well-being of the municipality, the health, safety and well-being of persons, and the protection of persons and property;

AND WHEREAS Section 128 of the Municipal Act permits a municipality to prohibit and regulate with respect to public nuisances, including matters that, in the opinion of council, are or could become or cause public nuisances;

AND WHEREAS the purposes of this by-law include managing the public assets of the Town, protecting the economic, social and environmental well-being of the Town, supporting the health, safety and well-being of persons in the Town, protecting persons and property in the Town and prohibiting and regulating with respect to public nuisances in the Town;

AND WHEREAS it is recognized that the tourist visitors' enjoyment, along with the lifestyle choices of its residents are key to the economic, social and environmental well-being of this municipality;

AND WHEREAS the Town wishes to ensure that the use of lands within the Town has a minimal adverse impact on the quiet enjoyment of surrounding lands;

AND WHEREAS, in the opinion of Council, the matters addressed in this by-law are, or could become or cause, public nuisances;

NOW THEREFORE, the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach HEREBY ENACTS as follows:

1. Short Title

This by-law shall be known as the "Noise and Nuisance By-law".

2. Definitions

- 2.1 Approved Fireworks Days shall mean those days of the year that are designated by Council where the discharge of fireworks is permissible by residents, including any hours restrictions that may be imposed from time to time; more specifically as set out in Appendix B of the By-law;
- 2.2 ATV/Off-Road Vehicle shall mean the following types of off-road vehicles:

"Off-Road Vehicle" shall mean an off-road vehicle intended for off-road and within the meaning of the *Off-Road Vehicles Act*, and as defined by the *Highway Traffic Act* and or the regulations thereto and includes off road vehicles as defined as follows:

"all-terrain vehicle" means an off-road vehicle that,

- a) has four wheels, the tires of which are all in contact with the ground,
- b) has steering handlebars,
- c) has a seat that is designed to be straddled by the driver, and
- d) is designed to carry,
 - (i) a driver only and no passengers, or
 - (ii) a driver and only one passenger, if the vehicle,

(A) has one passenger seat that is designed to be straddled by the passenger while sitting facing forward behind the driver, and
(B) is equipped with foot rests for the passenger that is separate from the foot rests for the driver:

"multi-purpose off-highway utility vehicle" means an off-road vehicle that,

- a) has four or more wheels, the tires of which are all in contact with the ground,
- b) has a steering wheel for steering control,
- c) has seats that are not designed to be straddled, and
- d) has a minimum cargo capacity of 159 kilograms;

"recreational off-highway vehicle" means an off-road vehicle that,

- a) has four or more wheels, the tires of which are all in contact with the ground,
- b) has a steering wheel for steering control,
- c) has seats that are not designed to be straddled, and
- d) has an engine displacement equal to or less than 1,000 cubic centimeters;

- **2.3 C.A.O.** shall mean the Chief Administrative Officer of the Town of Wasaga Beach, or his/her designate;
- 2.4 Construction includes erection, alteration, repair, dismantling, demolition, structural maintenance, painting, moving, land clearing, earth moving, grading, excavating, the laying of pipe and conduit whether above or below ground level, street and highway building, concreting, equipment installation and alteration and the structural installation of construction components and materials in any form or for any purpose, and includes any work in connection therewith;
- 2.5 Construction Equipment means any equipment or device designed and intended for use in construction or material handling, including but not limited to, air compressors, pile drivers, pneumatic or hydraulic tools, bulldozers, tractors, excavators, trenchers, cranes, derricks, loaders, scrapers, pavers, generators, off-highway haulers or trucks, ditchers, compactors, and rollers, pumps, concrete mixers, graders, or other material handling equipment;
- 2.6 Construction Prohibited Hours means construction activities, including the use of constructive equipment, must cease from the time set out, in the evening (pm) hours of one day, until the morning (am) hours of the following day. Where a day of the week is "named" (i.e. Sunday) the prohibition refers to the prohibited evening hours (pm) of the previous day (i.e. Saturday) until the morning hours (am) of the "named" day.
- 2.7 Construction Site means the area or portion of land used for construction or any other area used for any purpose related to the construction or for any related purpose;
- 2.8 Conveyance includes a vehicle and any other device employed to transport a person or goods from place to place, but does not include any such device or vehicle if operated only within the premises of a person;
- **2.9 Council** shall mean the Council of the Town of Wasaga Beach, at the times relevant;
- 2.10 County shall mean the County of Simcoe, Ontario Canada;
- 2.11 **Drone or Similar Vehicle** shall include any vehicle required to be licensed, whether or not it is licensed, that is capable or aerial flight for any purpose.
- 2.12 **Dumping** includes throwing, scattering, dropping, placing or otherwise depositing garbage, rubbish, refuse, yard waste, leaves or debris, except for in a garbage or recycling container intended for such use or placed in

an area for waste collection, and "Dump" shall have a corresponding meaning;

- **2.13 Dwelling** shall mean the actual room or rooms of a building that are used as residential accommodations;
- 2.14 Effective Muffler means an original approved muffler that was installed at the time of manufacture or an equivalent approved replacement muffler in good working order and when in constant operation that prevents excessive or unusual noise or excessive smoke, but it does not include a cut-out muffler, straight exhaust gutted muffler, Hollywood muffler, by-pass or similar device;
- 2.15 General Nuisance shall include, but not limited to, any public display, words or vocalizations or actions or activities that have the effect of displeasing or offending the average resident, visitor, or by-stander at the specific moment or in the viewing of property and the environment after the nuisance has occurred, whether or not the nuisance action occurred on public lands or from a private land(s) that are clearly visible by persons or the adjacent private or public lands;
- **2.16 Highway** includes a common and public highway, street, avenue, parkway, driveway, square, place, bridge, viaduct or trestle designed and intended for, or used by, the general public for the passage of vehicles;
- 2.17 Littering includes throwing, scattering, dropping, placing or otherwise depositing garbage, rubbish, refuse or debris, except in a garbage or recycling container intended for such use and, "Litter" shall have a corresponding meaning;
- 2.18 Motor Vehicle includes an automobile, motorcycle, and any other vehicle propelled or driven otherwise than by muscular power; but does not include the cars of electric or steam railways, or other motor vehicles running only upon rails, farm tractors, self-propelled implement of husbandry or road-building machine within the meaning of the Highway Traffic Act;
- **2.19 Motorized Conveyance** means a conveyance propelled or driven otherwise than by muscular, gravitational or wind power;
- 2.20 Municipality shall be all lands and waters contained within the boundaries set-out in regulation that constitute the Municipality of the Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach, and include any additions or annexations that may occur from time to time;

- 2.21 *Municipal Act* means the *Municipal Act, 2001*, S.O. 2001, c. 25; as amended;
- 2.22 Municipal Lands shall be Town Lands;
- **2.23 Musical Instrument** means any devices that are capable of producing sounds that are activated and controlled by a person;
- **2.24 Noise** means unwanted sound that is clearly audible at the point of reception;
- 2.25 Noise Nuisance Notwithstanding certain sounds are permitted by Appendix "A", any use of sounds that is excessive, alarming, unusual or annoying to a substantial number of residents or visitors or to the community at large, based upon the cumulative considerations of all factors including the nature and frequency of complaints, its audibility at Point of Reception, environmental conditions and any extenuating or aggravated circumstances including any medical conditions;
- **2.26 Nuisance** shall mean a General Nuisance or Noise Nuisance, Nuisance Event, Nuisance Dust or Nuisance Vibration.
- 2.27 Nuisance Dust shall mean the creation and dispersion of particular matter from one property to another that is created by an action or activity of an individual or business that has an adverse effect on the neighbourhood, but shall not include sand carried by winds.
- **2.28 Nuisance Vibration** shall mean vibration that is likely to disturb the inhabitants at the point of reception.
- 2.29 Nuisance Event means a gathering on Premises which, by reason of the conduct of the persons in attendance, results in any one or more of the following activities occurring:
 - a) Public disorderly conduct;
 - b) Public drunkenness or public intoxication;
 - c) The unlawful sale, furnishing or distribution of alcoholic beverages or controlled or illegal substances;
 - d) The deposit of refuse on public or private property;
 - e) Damage to or destruction of public or private property;
 - Pedestrian traffic, vehicular traffic or illegal parking that obstructs the free flow of traffic or could interfere with the ability to provide emergency services;
 - g) Unreasonable noise, including loud music or shouting, that is of such a volume or nature that it is likely to disturb many inhabitants of the Town;

- h) Unlawful open burning or fireworks discharge;
- i) Public disturbance, including a public brawl or violence; or
- j) Outdoor public urination or defecation;
- **2.30** Officer(s) shall mean a Municipal Law Enforcement Officer or an Ontario Provincial Police Officer, and anyone else appointed by Council to administer this By-law;
- 2.31 Order to Discontinue Activity shall mean the verbal or written Order of an Officer to stop the contravening activity(s), or to take such actions that will result in compliance with the By-law.
- **2.32** Order to Perform Work shall mean the verbal or written Order of an Officer to perform work or works necessary to comply with this by-law.
- **2.33 Owner** includes the person(s) who own property and includes tenants and persons in control or apparent control of the property at the relevant time(s);
- **2.34 Point of Reception** means any point on the premises of a person where sound or vibration originating from other than those premises is received.
- 2.35 Police Authority shall mean the Ontario Provincial Police;
- 2.36 **Power Device** is any powered device used in the servicing, maintenance or repair of property except devices driven by muscular power only and snow blowers;
- **2.37 Premises** means a piece of land and any buildings and structures on it, and includes a place of business, road, and any other location or place;
- 2.38 Public Place includes a Highway and any place to which the public has access as of right or by invitation, express or implied, which may include Public Property, and private property that is exposed to public view, but does not include a washroom facility;
- **2.39 Public Service Box** includes Canada Post Mailboxes, or relay box, newspaper box, Blue Box, Recycle Bins/boxes, Garbage enclosures/bins;
- 2.40 Residence shall mean where someone resides;
- 2.41 Residential Lands shall mean those lands set out in the Town's Zoning Bylaw that are designated R1, R2, RE or RM, R4 including any "Holding" variations of same, but does not include lands designated as Tourist Commercial (CT) or Commercial Accommodation (CA);

- 2.42 Senior Municipal Law Enforcement Officer shall mean the Senior Municipal Law Enforcement Officer of the Town of Wasaga Beach, or his/her designate;
- 2.43 Sound Amplifying System means any system of loudspeakers, amplifiers, microphones or reproducers or any combination of such equipment, including electronic devices or electro-mechanical transducers, used in the reproduction or amplification of music, speech or other sounds;
- 2.44 Sound Reproduction Device means a device intended primarily for the production of reproduction of sound, including, but not limited to, any musical instrument, radio receiver, television receiver, tape recorder, phonograph or sound amplifying system;
- 2.45 Special Event shall mean where a person has applied to the Town of Wasaga Beach to conduct a Special Event and Council has approved the event, with or without conditions;
- 2.46 Substantial Number of Residents/Visitors/Community at Large shall mean more than 5 individual property locations and/or 10 or more individual complaints on at least 3 separate properties.
- **2.47 T.A.C.** shall mean a Tourist Accommodation Conversion Property that utilizes more than one unit as a residence on a annual basis or as identified in Appendix "C", and may include a business that is licensed by the Town as a Tourist Accommodation.
- 2.48 Tourist Accommodation shall mean for the purpose of this By-law those lands set out in the Town's Zoning By-law that are designated CA or CT and are being used for the intended purpose, but does not include such CA or CT zoned lands that possess more than one unit that is utilized as a residence for more than 31 consecutive days;
- **2.49** Town shall mean the Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach;
- **2.50 Town Lands** shall mean all lands owned, leased or under control of the Town and Municipal lands shall have the same meaning;
- **2.51 Unusual Noise** is any sound that is likely to disturb the inhabitants of the Town;
- 2.52 Vibration shall mean a repetitive motion that causes a surface to transfer energy into another surface, person, or object that is detected by touch, visual or auditory senses.

2.53 Zoning By-law shall mean the Town's most current Zoning By-law, as amended, made pursuant to the Planning Act, R.S.O. Section 34.

3. General Prohibitions- Noise/Sound

3.1 <u>Clearly Audible – Sounds</u>

No person shall within the boundary of the Municipality shall make, cause, emit or permit the emission of sound resulting from an act listed below, which sound is clearly audible at the point of reception.

- 3.1.1 Racing of any motorized conveyance other than in a racing event regulated by law;
- 3.1.2 The operation of a motor vehicle in such a way that tires squeal;
- 3.1.3 The operation of any combustion engine or pneumatic device without an effective exhaust or intake muffling device in good working order and in constant operation;
- 3.1.4 The operation of a motorized conveyance or a motorized with a trailer resulting in banging, clanking, squealing or other like sounds, due to improperly secured load or equipment, or inadequate maintenance;
- 3.1.5 The operation of any horn or other warning device in or on a motorized conveyance except where required by law or in accordance with good safety practices;
- 3.1.6 The operation of any item of construction equipment without effective muffling devices in good working order and in constant operation;
- 3.1.7 Sounds- Place & Time Restricted Appendix "A" attached
 - a) Notwithstanding the authorizations to make noise that is not a nuisance in Appendix "A" above, where any premises is convicted of two (2) or more violations of emitting or causing to be emitted noises that are likely to disturb the inhabitants or any violation of creating a nuisance, shall lose the right to claim exemptions as set out in Appendix "A" for a period of two (2) years from the date of conviction of the second offence.
 - b) Where a person or corporation has lost the right to claim an exemption in Appendix "A" above, they may apply to Council for

reinstatement of such exemptions pursuant to the process set out in Section 11 of this by-law, and Council may grant such a request with any conditions they deem appropriate.

4. General Limitations – Residential Air Conditioners

- 4.1 No person shall emit or cause or permit the emission of sound from the operation of a residential air-conditioning device of a type referred to in Publication NPC-216 "Residential Air Conditioning Devices" resulting in a sound level at a point of reception located in a residential area in excess of the applicable sound level limit set out in Publication NPC- 216 "Residential Air Conditioning Devices".
- 4.2 No person shall emit or cause or permit the emission of any sound from any air-conditioning device of a type referred to in Publication NPC 216 "Residential Ai Conditioning Devices" unless one of the following applies:
 - 4.2.1 The device was manufactured prior to January 1, 1979.
 - 4.2.2 The device bears a label affixed by the manufacturer or distributor which states the year of manufacture and that the device when new complied with the sound emission standard set out in Publication MPC-216 – "Residential Air Conditioning Devices," as applicable to that type of device and date of manufacture.
 - 4.2.3 The owner, operator, manufacturer or distributor provides proof that the device when new complied with the sound emission standard set out in Publication NPC-216 "Residential Air Conditioning Devices," as applicable to that type of air conditioner and date of manufacturer.

5. Disturbing Religious Ceremony in a place of Worship

No person shall make, cause or permit the emission of sound that disturbs a religious ceremony in a place of worship.

6. Noise to Disturb

No person within the municipality shall make, cause, emit or permit the emission of noises likely to disturb the inhabitants except as otherwise permitted by this By-law.

7. Unusual Noises

No person within the municipality shall make, cause, emit or permit the emission of unusual noises except as otherwise permitted by this By-law.

8. Exemptions – General Noise

8.1 <u>Public Safety</u>

Notwithstanding any other provision of this By-law, it shall be lawful to emit or cause or permit the emission of sound or vibration in connection with emergency measures undertaken:

- a) for the immediate health, safety or welfare of the inhabitants or any of them; or
- b) for the preservation or restoration of property;

unless such sound or vibration is clearly of a longer duration or nature more disturbing, than I reasonably necessary for the accomplishment of such emergency purpose.

8.2 Snow Clearing and Maintenance Operations

Notwithstanding any other provision of this By-law, it shall be lawful to emit or cause or permit the emission of sound or vibration in connection with snow clearing and maintenance undertaken by the operation of vehicles, equipment and construction equipment for the clearing and removal of snow from public and private property.

8.3 Municipal Road Maintenance and Clearing Operations

Notwithstanding any other provision of this By-law, it shall be lawful to emit or cause or permit the emission of sound or vibration in connection with Municipal road maintenance and clearing operation required by the municipality.

8.4 Sounding or Ringing of Church Bells and Chimes

Notwithstanding any other provision of this By-law, it shall be lawful to emit or cause or permit the emission of sound or vibration in connection with the sounding or ringing of church bells and chimes, except where it causes a Nuisance Event.

8.5 The Sound of Military or other Bands or Parades

Notwithstanding any other provision of this By-law, it shall be lawful to emit or cause or permit the emission of sound or vibration in connection with the sound of any military or other band, or of any parade for which written permission has been obtained from the municipality.

8.6 Discharging of Firearms

Notwithstanding any other provision of this By-law, it shall be lawful to emit or cause or permit the emission of sound or vibration in connection with a Municipal Law Enforcement Officer, Animal Control Officer or Police Officer discharging a firearm in the lawful performance of duty, or where otherwise an exemption has been approved in accordance with this by- law.

9. Delegation to Designated Official(s)/Minor Noise Exemptions

- **9.1** Pursuant to section 23.1 of the Act, Council hereby delegates to the Designated Official the power to issue permits granting an exemption from any of the provisions of this by-law.
- **9.2** The delegation of power in subsection (2) may be revoked by Council at any time without notice.
- **9.3** Council shall exercise all powers and authority for granting exemptions under this by-law where the Designated Official refers the matter to Council.
- **9.4** Notwithstanding anything contained in this By-law, any person may make application to the Senior Municipal Law Enforcement Officer of the Town, to be granted an exemption from any provision of the By-law, for special circumstances where the exemption is for less than six (6) hours in length and the following apply:
 - 9.4.1 A one-time request and not for more than one date.
 - 9.4.2 Has not been previously granted in the last year immediately preceding the application for the same premises.
 - 9.4.3 It is for a family or religious celebration of less than 30 people.

- 9.4.4 Is not for profit or gain.
- 9.4.5 No admission fee or other money of valuable consideration is realized.
- 9.4.6 Is not open to the general public.
- 9.4.7 Is not held on public property.
- 9.4.8 Is conditional on not creating a nuisance noise or event.
- 9.5 Where the Senior Municipal Law Enforcement Officer has received a fully completed application in the required time, and when due consideration has been given to all factors surrounding the exemption request; the Senior Municipal Law Enforcement Officer may authorize an exemption that contains any conditions they feel are needed to properly regulate the activity.
- 9.6 Where such authorization is given; the application must adhere to the conditions, or the permit is VOID.
- 9.7 The Senior Municipal Law Enforcement Officer may revoke the permit at any time after issuance if they believe that false, inaccurate or outdated information was contained in the application.
- 9.8 The Senior Municipal Law Enforcement Officer may revoke the permit where he believes the event constitutes a nuisance or where other by-law infractions are alleged.
- 9.9 The Senior Municipal Law Enforcement Officer may refuse to issue an exemption permit and the aggrieved party may then appeal to the C.A.O, and failing approval, then Council, utilizing the same procedure set out in the Town's Business Licensing By-law for refusals of a business licence application.
- 9.10 Where someone does not qualify to apply to the Senior Municipal Law Enforcement Officer under 9.4 above, or they were refused or revoked, they may apply to Council, through the appropriate standing committee as the C.A.O. designates, to hear any such application or appeal (upon refusal/revocation under 9.7/9.8 above).

10. Exemptions – Special Event Approval

Notwithstanding the provisions of this By-law; where any person has applied for approval, of a Town sanctioned Special Event, and has requested in that approval:

- a) An activity or event that may directly or indirectly, create sounds that would otherwise contravene this by-law; or
- b) An activity or events specifically request exemptions to general prohibition for clearly audible sounds (section 3.1),

the approval obtained will be deemed to have also granted exemption to the applicable provisions of this By-law, unless specifically stated that it does not approve certain sounds or certain activities likely to create such sounds., nuisances, or a nuisance event.

11. Exemptions – Council

11.1 Application to Council

Notwithstanding anything contained in this By-law, any person may make application a minimum of 60 days prior to the date(s) requiring an exemption, to Council through the appropriate committee of Council as specified by the C.A.O., to be granted an exemption from any of the provisions of this By-law with respect to any source of sound or vibration for which he might be prosecuted and Council, by resolution, may refuse to grant any exemption or may grant the exemption applied for or any exemption of lesser effect and any exemption granted shall specify the time period of a duration not in excess of six months, during which it is effective, and may contain such items and conditions as Council sees fit.

11.2 Expedited Application

- 11.2.1 Where the event, for which exemptions is sought, is within 60 days or less, the application, after paying the prescribed fee set out in the Fees & Charges By-law, may submit an "expedited request for exemption for the Noise & Nuisance By-law" to the Municipal Law Enforcement Department for expedited processing.
- 11.2.2 Where such a fully completed application is received, the Senior Municipal Law Enforcement Officer shall immediately notify the C.A.O. of the application.
- 11.2.3 Where the C.A.O approves of the expedited process, the application shall be forwarded to Council members for review and response.
- 11.2.4 The C.A.O. shall issue a permit, with any additional conditions he/she deems appropriate, where all the following conditions have been met:

- (1) All of the Councillors notified under Subsection B have either:
 - (a) Not responded within 14 days of the notice; or
 - (b) Responded indicating that they have no objection to the application being approved.
- (2) The applicant has complied with all terms and conditions of approval of the last permit issued to them under this section, if any.
- (3) The applicant has provided the following:
 - (a) The applicant's name, address, and telephone number;
 - (b) The date, time and location of the event or activity for which the permit is sought and, where applicable, the number of people expected to attend;
 - (c) The purpose for which the permit is required;
 - (d) The description of any sound or construction equipment to be used;
 - (e) The name, address and telephone number of at least one contact person who will supervise the event or activity; and
 - (f) A written undertaking that one or more contact persons responsible for supervising the event or activity will be on -site during the entire event or activity to ensure compliance with the terms and conditions of the permit.
- (4) The applicant enters into a written agreement satisfactory to the C.A.O. concerning compliance with the terms and conditions of the permit.
- (5) The applicant has paid all required fees.
- 11.2.5 A permit issued under Subsection 11.2.4 shall be subject to the following terms and conditions:
 - (1) The sound emitted from any equipment shall not create a noise nuisance, or nuisance event;
 - (2) Where the sound does create a noise nuisance or nuisance event, the applicant shall comply with any request of an officer with respect to the volume of sound from the equipment to ensure compliance with this by-law;

- (3) No sound or construction equipment other than the equipment approved under the permit shall be used by the applicant;
- (4) The event or activity shall be restricted to the approved location; and
- (5) The permission granted is for the date and times for the event or activity as set out in the permit.
- 11.2.6 Where the C.A.O. refuses to grant a permit under this section, the applicant shall be notified in writing and advised that they may appeal the C.A.O.'s decision to Council and may avail of the appeal process set out in 9.10 above.

12. Nuisance Control

12.1 <u>Prohibitions – Nuisance – General</u>

No person without lawful authority, within the town boundary of the Municipality shall make, cause, be a party to the act, or permit any act or action that includes, but not limited to the following prohibited nuisances:

- a) Disorderly conduct;
- b) Public Drunkenness or Public Intoxication;
- c) The unlawful sale, furnishing or distribution of alcoholic beverages or controlled substances;
- d) The deposit of refuse on public property;
- e) Damage, defacement or destruction of public property;
- f) Actions to impede pedestrian traffic, vehicular traffic or, illegal parking that obstructs the free flow of traffic or could interfere with the ability to provide emergency services;
- g) Unreasonable noise for the circumstances, regardless if it would otherwise be in "permitted hours" of the Appendix "A" (Time & Place Sounds);
- h) Unlawful open burning or fireworks in a public area;
- i) Public disturbances, including public brawls or public fights;
- j) Emitting an excessive amount of smoke, dust or airborne particulate matter in a public place;
- k) Knock over, or attempt to knock over, a portable toilet, a public service box, including a Canada Post mail box or relay box, newspaper box or a garbage or recycling container, lawfully located on a Highway;
- Block, interfere, obstruct or otherwise impede the passage of any pedestrian on a Highway or Municipal and other Property, including sidewalks, parks, pedestrian mall, splash pad, bus shelters or public benches;

- m) Be within 3meters of a street, sidewalk or pedestrian area and discharge or release fire, water, vapours or noise by any means whatsoever;
- n) Outdoor public urination, defecation or vomiting or spitting.

13. <u>Prohibition – Nuisance Event</u>

- **13.1** No person shall sponsor, conduct, continue, host, create, cause, permit or attend a Nuisance Event.
- **13.2** No person shall cause, create or be a party to a nuisance, including a nuisance event, anywhere within the Municipality.
- **13.3** No person who, individually or jointly with others, is an owner, occupant, tenant or who otherwise has rightful possession of or is in possessory control of any Premises, shall cause or permit a Nuisance Event on said Premises.
- **13.4** Upon the order of the Senior Municipal Law Enforcement Officer, CAO or the Police Authority, every person who is sponsoring, conducting, continuing, hosting, creating, causing, permitting or attending a Nuisance Event on specified Premises shall cease such sponsoring, conducting, continuing, hosting, creating, causing, permitting or attending of such Nuisance Event, and every person not residing on such Premises shall leave such Premises.
- **13.5** An order under this section shall identify:
 - a) The location of the Premises on which the contravention is occurring;
 - b) The reasonable particulars of the contravention of this by-law; and
 - c) The date and time by which there must be compliance with the order.
- **13.6** An order under this section may be given orally or may be served personally on the person to whom it is directed.
- **13.7** No person shall fail to leave Premises after having been directed to leave by an order pursuant to this section.
- **13.8** An Officer, in the interest of public safety, may temporarily close any highway or portion thereof to public travel where a Nuisance Event is occurring on or adjacent to the highway.

- **13.9** Where a highway or portion of a highway has been temporarily closed under this by-law, the common law right of passage by the public and the common law right of access by an owner of land abutting the highway or portion of the highway are restricted, as directed by an Officer.
- **13.10** No person shall use a highway or portion of a highway that has been temporarily closed under this by-law except with lawful authority or in accordance with the direction of an Officer.

14. Fees- Nuisance Party

- 14.1 The Town may imposed a fee or charge upon any person sponsoring, conducting, continuing, hosting, creating, causing or permitting a Nuisance Party and/or the owner of Premises where the Nuisance Event is held who causes or permits the Nuisance Event.
- **14.2** The amount of the said fee or charge shall be the estimate amount of administrative costs, costs of enforcement and all other costs incurred by the Town in responding to and addressing the Nuisance Event pursuant to this by-law and shall include but not limited to the following:
 - a) Police Response
 - b) Fire Response
 - c) Ambulance Response
 - d) Municipal Law Enforcement Response
 - e) Road Department Response
- **14.3** Fees or charges imposed on a person pursuant to this by-law constitute a debt of the person to the Town.
- 14.4 Where all the owners of certain Premises are responsible for paying certain fees and charges pursuant to this by-law, the Town may add such fees and charges to the tax roll for the Premises and collect them in the same manner as municipal taxes.

15. <u>Enforcement</u>

- **15.1** Council hereby authorizes all Officers to enforce this by-law.
- **15.2** Each Officer is hereby authorized to inform any person of the provisions of this by-law and to request compliance therewith.

- **15.3** No person shall willfully obstruct, hinder or otherwise interfere with an Officer in the performance of the Officer's duties, rights, functions, powers or authority under this by-law.
- **15.4** Where an Officer has reasonable grounds to believe that an offence under this by-law has been committed by a person, the Officer may require the name, address and proof of identity of that person, and the person shall supply the required information.
- **15.5** Where anyone fails or refuses to immediately identify themselves to an Officer or where the information is found to be false or misleading, they shall be deemed to have willfully obstructed an Officer in the discharge of their duties.
- **15.6** Upon conviction for an offence under this by-law, in addition to any other remedy and to any penalty imposed by this by-law, the court in which the conviction has been entered and any court of competent jurisdiction thereafter may make an order prohibiting the continuation or repetition of the offence by the person convicted.

16. Entry and Inspection

Officers shall have the right to enter and inspect property pursuant to the *Municipal Act, 2001*, sections 444 and 445, and set out in the Municipal By-law.

17. Obstruction

No person shall obstruct or attempt to obstruct any Officer or other person, who is exercising a power or performing a duty under this By-law or any other Town of Wasaga Beach By-law or the *Municipal Act, 2001*, S.O. 2001, c. 25, as amended or its predecessor.

18. Orders and Remedial Action

18.1 If an Officer is satisfied that a contravention of any By-law has occurred, the Officer may make an order requiring the person who contravened the By-law to discontinue the contravening activity, known as an Order to Discontinue Activity, requiring the person who contravened the By-law, or who caused or permitted the contravention, including the owner or occupier of the Land on which the contravention occurred, to discontinue the contravention.

- 18.1.1 An order under subsection 18.1 shall set out,
 - a) reasonable particulars of the contravention adequate to identify the contravention and the municipal address on which the contravention occurred;
 - b) the date by which there must be compliance with the order; and
- 18.2 If an Officer is satisfied that a contravention of any By-law has occurred, the Officer may make an order requiring the person who contravened the Bylaw to do work to correct the contravention, known as a Work Order to Perform Work.
 - 18.2.1 An order under subsection 18.2 shall set out,
 - reasonable particulars of the contravention adequate to identify the contravention and the municipal address of the property on which the contravention occurred;
 - b) the work to be done and the date by which the work must be done; and

19. Offence

- **19.1** Every person who contravenes any of the provisions of this by-law is guilty of an offence and, pursuant to section 429 of the Act; all contraventions of this by-law are designated as continuing offences.
- **19.2** Every person, excluding a corporation, who is convicted of an offence, is liable to a maximum fine of \$25,000 for a first offence and a maximum fine of \$50,000 for a subsequent offence.
- **19.3** Every corporation who is convicted of an offence is liable to a maximum of \$50,000 for the first offence and to a maximum of \$100,000 for a subsequent offence.
- **19.4** In addition to the fine amounts set out in subsection 19.2 and 19.3, for each hour that an offence continues, it shall be deemed a continuing offence and the minimum fine shall be \$500 for every additional hour the offence continues to a maximum of \$10,000.

20. Schedules, Tables and Maps

The Appendix "A", Prohibitions by Time and Place, and three (3) associated aerial photographs, shall form part of this by-law.

21. Validity and Severability

Every provision of this By-law is declared to be severable from the remainder and if any provision of this By-law shall be declared invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction such declaration shall not affect the validity of the remainder.

22. Conflicts

- 22.1 This By-law shall apply in addition to the provisions of any other Town Bylaw and the *Municipal Act, 2001,* S.O. 2001 c. 25, as amended, provided that in the event of conflict with the provisions of any other Town By-law or the *Municipal Act, 2001,* S.O. 2001 c. 25, as amended, this By-law shall be paramount, provided such provisions are not contrary to law.
- 22.2 Nothing in this By-law shall limit any other statutory or common law rights or powers of the municipality or any Officer to enter on Land.

23.<u>Repeal</u>

THAT By-Law #2016-97 is hereby repealed.

24. Effective date

THAT this By-law shall come into force and take effect on the date of its final passing.







BY-LAW NO. 2019-115

A By-law to amend By-law No. 2019-15, being a by-law to control Noise and Nuisance within the Municipality

WHEREAS Section 8 of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, as amended provides that the powers of a municipality under this or any other Act shall be interpreted broadly so as to confer broad authority on the municipality to enable the municipality to govern its affairs as it considers appropriate and to enhance the municipality's ability to respond to municipal issues;

AND WHEREAS Section 9 of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, as amended, grants municipalities the capacity, rights, power and privileges of a natural person for the purpose of exercising its authority under the Act;

AND WHEREAS Section 11(2) of the Municipal Act permits a municipality to pass by-laws respecting the public assets of the municipality, the economic, social and environmental well-being of the municipality, the health, safety and well-being of persons, and the protection of persons and property;

AND WHEREAS Section 128 of the Municipal Act permits a municipality to prohibit and regulate with respect to public nuisances, including matters that, in the opinion of council, are or could become or cause public nuisances;

AND WHEREAS Council of The Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach passed By-Law No. 2019-15, to control Noise and Nuisance within the Municipality, deems it expedient to amend the said by-law regarding noise nuisances and penalty provisions;



A By-law to amend By-law No. 2019-15, being a by-law to control Noise and Nuisance within the Municipality

WHEREAS Section 8 of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, as amended provides that the powers of a municipality under this or any other Act shall be interpreted broadly so as to confer broad authority on the municipality to enable the municipality to govern its affairs as it considers appropriate and to enhance the municipality's ability to respond to municipal issues;

AND WHEREAS Section 9 of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, as amended, grants municipalities the capacity, rights, power and privileges of a natural person for the purpose of exercising its authority under the Act;

AND WHEREAS Section 11(2) of the Municipal Act permits a municipality to pass by-laws respecting the public assets of the municipality, the economic, social and environmental well-being of the municipality, the health, safety and well-being of persons, and the protection of persons and property;

AND WHEREAS Section 128 of the Municipal Act permits a municipality to prohibit and regulate with respect to public nuisances, including matters that, in the opinion of council, are or could become or cause public nuisances;

AND WHEREAS Council of The Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach passed By-Law No. 2019-15, to control Noise and Nuisance within the Municipality, deems it expedient to amend the said by-law regarding noise nuisances and penalty provisions;

NOW THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF WASAGA BEACH HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

2.20 is an instrument which is sensitive to and calibrated for the measurement of sound;



BY-LAW NO. 2023-74

A By-Law to Prohibit Vehicular Nuisance Events

WHEREAS Section 8 of the *Municipal Act, 2001,* as amended, provides that the powers of a municipality under this or any other Act shall be interpreted broadly so as to confer broad authority on the municipality to enable the municipality to govern its affairs as it considers appropriate and to enhance the municipality's ability to respond to municipal issues;

AND WHEREAS Section 9 of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, as amended, grants municipalities the capacity, rights, power and privileges of a natural person for the purpose of exercising its authority under the Act;

AND WHEREAS under Section 11 of the *Municipal Act, 2001,* as amended, a lower tier municipality may pass by-laws respecting matters within the sphere of jurisdiction set out therein;

AND WHEREAS Section 11(2) of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, permits a municipality to pass by-laws respecting the public assets of the municipality, the economic, social and environmental well-being of the municipality, the health, safety and well-being of persons, and the protection of persons and property;

AND WHEREAS Section 128 of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, as amended, provides that a municipality may prohibit and regulate with respect to public nuisances, including matters that, in the opinion of council, are or could become or cause public nuisances;

AND WHEREAS the Town has been the targeted location for disruptive events that do not have a permit or permission from the Town involving motor vehicles;

AND WHEREAS Council is of the opinion that these events could cause a public nuisance;

AND WHEREAS Section 128(2) of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, as amended, provides that if the opinion of council under this section, if arrived in good faith, is not subject to review by any court;

AND WHEREAS The Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach has enacted By-law No. 2019-15 being a By-law to control Noise and Nuisance within the Municipality;

AND WHEREAS pursuant to the Municipal Act, 2001, SO. 2001, C.25, as amended, Section 11(3), a Municipality may pass by-laws respecting matters within their jurisdiction which includes highways, including opened and unopened road allowances and rights of way under the jurisdiction of the Town, and to permit temporary encroachment thereupon;

AND WHEREAS Section 35 of the *Municipal Act, 2001,* states that a municipality may pass by-laws removing or restricting the common law right of passage by the public over a highway and the common law right of access to the highway;

AND WHEREAS Section 23.1 of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, confirms that a municipality has authority to delegate its powers and duties;

NOW THEREFORE, the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach HEREBY ENACTS as follows:

1. Short Title

This by-law shall be known as the "Car Rally By-law"

2. Assumption of By-law 2019-15

2.1 For the purposes of interpreting and implementing this By-law, the provisions within By-law 2019-15, known as the "Noise and Nuisance By-law" are applicable to the matters within this By-law.

3 **Definitions**

- 3.1 **Car Rally** means any formal or informal event or exhibition consisting of the gathering of Vehicles. Such event may include, but are not, limited to Street-takeovers, Contests or Stunts;
- 3.2 **Contest** means any activity where one or more Persons engage in any of the following:

1. Driving two or more Vehicles at a rate of speed that is a marked departure from the lawful rate of speed and in a manner that indicates the drivers of the Vehicles are engaged in a competition;

2. Driving a Vehicle in a manner that indicates an intention to chase another Vehicle;

3. Driving a Vehicle without due care and attention, without reasonable consideration for other persons using the highway, or in a manner that may endanger any person by,

- i. driving a Vehicle at a rate of speed that is a marked departure from the lawful rate of speed,
- ii. outdistancing or attempting to outdistance one or more other Vehicles while driving at a rate of speed that is a marked departure from the lawful rate of speed, or

iii repeatedly changing lanes in close proximity to other Vehicles so as to advance through the ordinary flow of traffic while driving at a rate of speed that is a marked departure from the lawful rate of speed;

4. Racing a Vehicle, tests of physical endurance involving Vehicles, or exhibition of speed or acceleration on any highway, roadway, property, or parking lot;

- 3.3 **Person** means the singular or plural of an individual or corporation, partnership, trust, incorporated or unincorporated association, joint venture, limited liability company, or other entity of any kind;
- 3.4 **Spectator** means any Person who is knowingly present at, and views, a Car Rally, when such presence is the result of an affirmative choice to attend or participate in the event. For purposes of determining whether a Person is a spectator, finders of fact shall consider the relationship between the operator of the Vehicle and the Person. Evidence of gambling or betting on the outcome of a Contest or Stunt, filming or recording the event, posting the event on social media, and any other factor that would tend to show knowing attendance or participation. This definition excludes *bona fide* members of the news media for news media purposes;
- 3.5 **Stunt** means any activity where a Person engages in any of the following.

1. Driving a Vehicle in a manner that indicates an intention to lift some or all of its tires from the surface of the ground, but not including the use of lift axles on commercial motor vehicles;

2. Driving a Vehicle in a manner that indicates an intention to cause some or all of its tires to lose traction with the surface of the road;

3. Driving a Vehicle in a manner that indicates an intention to spin it or cause it to circle, without maintaining control over it;

4. Driving two or more Vehicles side by side or in proximity to each other, where one of the Vehicles occupies a lane of traffic or other portion of the highway intended for use by oncoming traffic for a period of time that is longer than is reasonably required to pass another Vehicle;

5. Driving a Vehicle with a Person in the trunk or on top of the motor vehicle;

6. Driving a Vehicle while the driver is not sitting in the driver's seat;

7. Driving a Vehicle without due care and attention, without reasonable consideration for other Persons, or in a manner that may endanger any Person;

8. Operating a Vehicle for the purpose of filming or recording activities of a street takeover, Contest, or exhibition;

9. Performing a burnout whereby a Vehicle is kept stationary, or is in motion, while the wheels are spun, resulting in friction which causes the Vehicle's tires to emit smoke;

10. Performing a doughnut whereby the front or rear of the Vehicle is rotated around the opposite set of wheels in a continuous motion which may cause a circular skid-mark pattern of rubber on the driving surface or the tires to emit smoke from friction, or both;

3.6 **Vehicle** means any means of transportation propelled or driven by any kind of power, excluding purely muscular. Examples include, but are not limited to, all motor vehicles, trailers, traction engines, farm tractors, road-building machines, motorcycles, autocycles, mopeds, electric bicycles, all-terrain vehicles, and off-road vehicles. This definition includes vehicles not licensed to operate on a highway or roadway.

4. General Prohibitions

- 4.1 No Person shall, within the boundary of the Municipality, sponsor, collect money for, conduct, coordinate, facilitate, advertise, continue, host, create, cause, permit, participate in, be a Spectator, and/or attend any Car Rally that is unsanctioned and unapproved by the Town of Wasaga Beach.
- 4.2 No Person shall knowingly ride as a passenger in a Car Rally.
- 4.3 No Person shall purposefully cause the movement of traffic, including pedestrian traffic, to slow, stop, or be impeded in any way for such Car Rally.

5. Fees, Enforcement, Orders, and Remedial Action

5.1 Any Municipal Law Enforcement Officer, Ontario Provincial Police Officer, Fire Chief and anyone else appointed by Council to administer this By-law may take any action within By-law 2019-15 to enforce this By-law, and issue orders and charges against any Persons found to be contravening this bylaw, including the owner or occupier of the land on which the contravention occurs.

- 5.2 A Municipal Law Enforcement Officer, Ontario Provincial Police Officer, Fire Chief, and anyone else appointed by Council to administer this By-law is authorized to order a road closure for the purposes of upholding this by-law.
- 5.3 A Municipal Law Enforcement Officer, Ontario Provincial Police Officer, Fire Chief, and anyone else appointed by Council to administer this By-law may temporarily close any road to public travel for the purpose of preventing or stopping a Car Rally for a period of time not more than 3 consecutive days.
- 5.4 Where a road or portion of a road has been temporarily closed under this by-law, the common law right of passage by the public over the road and the common law right of access to the road are restricted.

6. Effective Date

6.1 THAT this By-law shall come into force and take effect on the date of its final passing.

Long weekend traffic has slowed down access to the main beach areas in the Town of Wasaga Beach considerably, according to Huronia West OPP.

A BY-LAW TO ADOPT A MUNICIPALLY SIGNIFICANT PUBLIC SPECIAL EVENTS POLICY AND GUIDELINES FOR THE TOWN OF WASAGA BEACH

WHEREAS pursuant to section 9 of the *Municipal Act*, 2001 S.O. 2001, chapter 25 a municipality has the capacity, rights, powers and privileges of a natural person for the purpose of exercising its authority under this or any other Act;

AND WHEREAS pursuant to section 8. (1) of the *Municipal Act*, 2001 S.O. 2001, chapter 25 the powers of a municipality under this or any other Act shall be interpreted broadly so as to confer broad authority on the municipality to enable the municipality to govern its affairs as it considers appropriate to enhance the municipality's ability to respond to municipal issues;

AND WHEREAS the Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach wishes to encourage the holding of municipally significant public special events in the Town of Wasaga Beach and deems it advisable to create the Municipally Significant Public Special Events Policy and Guidelines to govern the holding of municipally significant public special events on public property and guidelines;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach HEREBY ENACTS as follows:

- 1. THAT the Municipally Significant Public Special Events Policy and Guidelines, Appendix "A", attached hereto and forming part of this By-law be adopted.
- 2. THAT this By-Law shall come into force and take effect on the date of its final passing.

PURPOSE

Council is interested in supporting municipally significant public special events in the Town of Wasaga Beach that are provided in a safe environment having regard for Provincial regulations pertaining to the inclusion of alcohol related activities.

SCOPE

This policy and guideline has been developed to provide staff with the ability to deem an event as municipally significant, as per the guidelines of the Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario.

POLICY

1. Definitions

- a. "Council" means the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach;
- b. **"Municipally Significant Public Special Event**" means an exhibition, event, or function held within the Municipality of the Town of Wasaga Beach that is defined as;
 - i. Enhance or promote a community asset (i.e. waterfront, parks, organization);
 - ii. Encourage, attract and promote community involvement, participation at little or no cost;
 - iii. Partner with and/or provides a venue for local businesses, organizations and residents to form part of the activities (i.e. vendors, facilitate an event activity).
- c. "Municipal", "Municipality", or "Municipal Corporation" means the Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach;
- d. "Permit" shall mean any permit issued in accordance with the provision of this By-Law;

- e. "Person" shall include a corporation, business entity or group;
- f. "OPP" shall mean Ontario Provincial Police;
- g. **"Town or Public Facility"** means road allowances, parks, property or buildings controlled by the Town or other government agencies.

2. Processing of Applications

In accordance with Regulation 389/91 of the Liquor License Act (Special Occasions Permits), all public events to be deemed "Municipally Significant", the applicant must give written notification before the event is to take place to the Clerk:

- 30 days before the event is to take place, if it is expected that fewer than 5,000 people will attend the event; or
- 60 days before the event is to take place, if it is expected that 5,000 people or more will attend the event.

3. Application Requirements:

Applications must include the following items in order to be processed in a timely manner. Incomplete applications will not be processed and will be returned to the applicant.

- Name and contact information of the event organizer, association, organization;
- Description of the event including target audience, entrance fees and activities;
- Logistics: Location, set up including area where alcohol is to be served, security, number of servers;
- Date and time of the event and times when alcohol will be served;
- Purpose of the event and how it benefits the community of Wasaga Beach
- Proof of insurance naming the Town of Wasaga Beach as an additionally insured in the amount of no less than \$5 Million, as per the Special Events Bylaw #2016-03

4. Delegation & Dispute:

The Town Clerk of The Corporation of the Town of Wasaga Beach is delegated the responsibility to process applications in accordance with this policy and shall notify Council of all applications. Any dispute from the public regarding application which do not meet the requirements of this policy and as such are denied, shall address Council in accordance with the Town's Procedural By-law pertaining to Delegations. Council will then make a determination regarding the issue.

POLICY REVIEW AND PROCEDURE

This Policy will be review as required, but in any case no later than five (5) years from the date of the most recent review.

The Special Events Coordinator will be responsible for initiating the review of this Policy.


By-Law No. 2016-24

The purpose of this By-Law would allow the Town to proceed with the construction of Bay Colony Area (i.e. "Phase 2") as a Local Improvement in accordance with the *Municipal Act*, Ont. Reg. 586/06.

The effect of this by-law is to outline the terms and conditions of the special area rate that will be levied to the owners of land who will or may derive a benefit from the said works, in the amount sufficient to pay for the capital costs.

The proposed servicing rates are as resolved by the Public Works Committee in July 2012 and subsequently approved by Council.

This By-Law is properly before Council for consideration.

Special Event Application Process and Required Forms

The information requested by the Special Events Application will be used to determine your eligibility for the permit requested. Special Event Permits are required in accordance with bylaw No. 2016-03.

The application deadlines are outlined as follows:

- New Community events, lasting one (1) day or less and not requiring the approval or assistance of the external agencies, held on Town Property, the application be submitted to the Town at least 60 days prior to event;
- New Community event or Tourism event, lasting two (2) or more days and not requiring the approval or assistance of the external agencies, held on Town Property, the application be submitted to the Town at least 90 days prior to the first day of the proposed event;
- New Major Tourism event lasting one (1) day or more, with one or more of the following situations: held on Ontario Parks Property (i.e. Beach Area 1) and/or with AGCO, OPP requirements (such as a beer garden), with economic benefit to the Town, the application be submitted to the Town at least 180 days prior to the event;
- Any Returning Community events with no major changes from past years, lasting one (1) day or less, held on Town Property, the application be submitted to the Town at least 60 days prior event;
- Any **Returning Major event**, with one or more of the following situations: held on Ontario Parks Property (i.e. Beach Area 1) and/or with AGCO, OPP requirements (such as a beer garden), with economic benefit to the Town, the application **be submitted to the Town at least 90 days prior to the first day of the event;**

<u>Approved permits must be posted at the event site for the entire duration of the event.</u> Events not compliant with this may be subject to fines and/or removal of event materials at organizers cost.

Non-profit event - \$50.00 For profit (<5,000 attendees) - \$300.00 For profit (5,000 – 14,999 attendees) - \$450.00 For profit (15,000+ attendees) - \$600.00



Council Takes Action to Strengthen Town's Emergency Preparedness and Improve its Highly Coordinated Town-OPP Response to Illegal Car Rallies

Town of Wasaga Beach adopts new emergency framework that includes proactive, full-scale road closures, a proposed Community Safety Zone, and a highly coordinated, tiered emergency response in cooperation with Ontario Provincial Police (OPP)

WASAGA BEACH – The Town of Wasaga Beach is taking the next step to strengthen its approach to dealing with illegal car rallies. Council has approved a plan that will see the Town adopt a proactive, coordinated municipal emergency response, in partnership with the OPP.

The Town's Strict but Fair approach to illegal nuisance events will continue to focus on prevention-first. It will now also adopt a proactive, tiered municipal emergency response plan that includes:

- Greater Town-OPP coordination and information sharing
- Activating an Incident Management Team that will determine the risk to public safety and a tiered-level of response to any potential or active, illegal event

Key parts of the new, tiered emergency response include, but are not limited to:

Proactive, Tiered Emergency Response Plan

At the lowest tier, when the Town and OPP become aware that an illegal event is likely to occur, the coordinated response will include:

- Activating the Incident Management Team
- The Town issuing orders to cease and desist to organizer(s) of illegal car rallies under the authority of the Municipal Act with the intent to pursue maximum penalties in all cases

At a higher tier, when there is a high level of risk to public safety or an illegal event is imminent, the coordinated response may also include:

- Activating the Emergency Operations Centre
- Vehicle inspection stations where unsafe vehicles will be towed and impounded
- Maximum "illegal car rally" towing and impound fees in effect
- Proactive, full-scale road closures that would see the Town's main access points limited to local traffic only
- Traffic diversion zones in effect
- Parking lot closures
- Beach Drive open to pedestrian traffic only (especially on long weekends or during special events)
- Coordinated Town-OPP communications on Town and OPP social media channels, and through local media, to keep local residents, businesses and visitors informed

At the highest tier or highest level of risk to public safety, the coordinated response would include all of the above, plus:

- Increased OPP presence
- Additional road closures and traffic diversion zones in effect

Community Safety Zone

The Town is adopting this highly coordinated, tiered emergency response plan in addition to pursuing new measures – including a **Downtown Community Safety Zone** that would impact specific areas of concern.

While the emergency response plan aims to prevent illegal events from taking place by issuing orders and conducting vehicle inspections on organizers and participants outside the municipality – the proposed **Downtown Community Safety Zone** will make it easier for law enforcement to fine and charge anyone that is speeding or stunt driving within the Town of Wasaga Beach. It will also double minimum fines and penalties for speeding and stunt driving.

Mayor Brian Smith: "Today we are taking further action to protect our residents, visitors and businesses from people who break the law and threaten public safety. The Town of Wasaga Beach is home to the world's longest freshwater beach. We are a beautiful, safe, coastal community in South Georgian Bay that welcomes millions of visitors from across Canada and around the world each year. Tourism and special events are what we do best, and Wasaga Beach has a storied history of love for cars – fast ones, old ones, rare ones, you name it. I've seen all the Fast and Furious films, I know what Fuel Fest is – and I can tell you the Town would love to help organize an event that Vin Diesel and Cody Walker would want to show up to. But illegal events, and illegal car rallies organized by people that do not have permits and do not respect the law, are not welcome in Wasaga Beach. We are proud to partner with the Town of Wasaga Beach, By-Law and our partners in public safety in a coordinated response to those who choose to jeopardize the safety and wellbeing of residents and visitors to the Town. Officers will be actively patrolling and anyone who participates in unlawful behaviour may be charged and their vehicle impounded."

Kenn Voss, Owner, Wasaga Beach Canadian Tire: "We support the Town and Council in taking this proactive, coordinated approach to dealing with illegal car rallies. These large nuisance events damage private property, threaten the safety of our customers and local residents, and are completely unnecessary."

- The proposed Downtown Community Safety Zone would impact the main arterial roads in the Downtown area. These would include:
 - River Road West: East of Blueberry Trail to Village Gate Drive
 - Mosley Street: East of 18th Street North to Main Street
 - Old Mosley Street: East of 18th Street North to 13th Street South
 - Main Street
 - Beach Drive
 - 3rd Street North
 - Spruce Street
 - River Road East: East of Main Street to Zoo Park Road

- Recently, the Town also passed a new bylaw to unlock additional powers under Bill 128 of the Municipal Act, that permits it to close roads and enact other measures during declared nuisance events that typically, municipalities cannot do.
- The maximum penalty for violating the <u>Town of Wasaga Beach Car</u> <u>Rally Bylaw</u> is \$25,000

3. **THIS COURT ORDERS** that any persons having notice of this Order are hereby restrained and enjoined from directly or indirectly, by any means whatsoever breaching the Town of Wagasa Beach: By-law No. 2023-74, A By-Law to Prohibit Vehicular Nuisance Events.

4. **THIS COURT ORDERS** that any persons having notice of this Order are hereby restrained and enjoined from attending and/or participating in the H2Oi car-rally, or any unauthorized car-rally scheduled to occur in the Town of Wasaga Beach from September 1-4, 2023.

5. **THIS COURT ORDERS** that any police officer with the Ontario Provincial Police ("OPP") shall have authorization to arrest and remove any person who has knowledge of this Order and who the OPP have reasonable and probable grounds to believe is contravening or has contravened any provision of this Order, subject to the discretion of the OPP with respect to the timing and means of enforcement.

6. **THIS COURT ORDERS** that the terms of this Order shall remain in force until varied or discharged by a further Order of the Court.

7. THIS COURT ORDERS that notice of this Order shall be given by the creation of a

URL on the Town of Wasaga website whereby this Order can be viewed and downloaded, and the Town issuing a press release containing the URL linking to the Order. Additional notice of this Order may be given by:

a. posting copies of this Order in or around Wasaga Beach;

- b. publishing this Order online on any social media accounts promoting and/or advertising the H2Oi car rally or related contraventions of the Town's by-laws;
- c. reading the Order to any person, including but not limited to reading the Order over an amplification system; and
- d. any other manner deemed appropriate by the Town of Wasaga beach or OPP.

8. **THIS COURT ORDERS** that this Order shall not apply to persons acting in the course of or in the exercise of a statutory duty, power or authority.

9. **THIS COURT ORDERS** that the terms of this Order bind the respondents and every other person or legal entity who is subject to this Order and is given notice of the Order, as of the time such respondents, person or legal entity first receives notice of the Order, and whether or not such respondents, person or legal entity has been served with a copy of the Order.
