If you are interested in boating or paddling, we offer easy access to Georgian Bay and the Nottawasaga River.

We also have an extensive network of hiking and walking trails that you can access year-round.

Our 14 kilometres of sandy shore is the perfect spot to spend quality time. Imagine being able to walk our beach 365 days of the year. We guarantee you'll always see something new.

Wasaga Beach is an affordable town, too. We have low taxes and a long history of good fiscal management, allowing us to deliver quality services.

WASAGA BEACH AN AFFORDABLE PLACE TO CALL HOME

When it comes to owning a home or vacation property the Town of Wasaga Beach is an affordable option compared to so many other places in Ontario.

And not only do you find affordability here but also an amazing lifestyle. Hiking, boating, golf, a world-class natural waterfront, good schools, health care, shops, and so much more are part of the great experience waiting in our community.

Our proximity to other Simcoe County communities and the GTA also make us an attractive place to hang your hat.

Property taxes in Wasaga Beach are among the most affordable in the region. Our town's tax rate is at the low end for its comparators.

In 2021, the average household tax bill, based on a home assessed at \$330,000, is \$3,311. The town collects 58 percent of that amount, with 27 percent going to the County of Simcoe and the balance to the school board.

The taxes we collect support the delivery of important municipal services in our community, plus capital projects.

These dollars help fund our operations; ensure our roads are in great shape, that our water and sewage facilities function properly, and that we can invest in new amenities such as our twin-pad arena and library.

The town has a long history of good financial stewardship and independent reviews reaffirm this each year. As a result, we are well positioned to meet the needs of a growing community now and in the years ahead.

The town's operating budget for 2021 sits at \$42-million and our capital budget is \$54-million.

A key part of our capital budget is the new twin-pad arena and library we are building. This is positive news for our many local user groups.

We have a healthy real estate market in Wasaga Beach and throughout the region. This makes us an affordable place to purchase, but also ensures good re-sale value.

Along with offering single detached homes, townhomes, cottages and condominiums, Wasaga Beach offers land-lease options through Parkbridge.

Ultimately, if you want to be a part of Wasaga Beach there are options.

NEW LIBRARY AND TWIN-PAD ARENA WILL SERVE COMMUNITY FOR GENERATIONS

Construction started earlier this fall on our new twin-pad arena and library.

This \$59-million investment in our community will result in two new NHL-sized ice surfaces, an indoor walking track, space for musical and theatrical events, and a modern library with room for programs as well as an enhanced materials collection.

Our 117,000-square-foot modern complex will also provide community organizations space to meet and conduct programs.

The facility is replacing our existing library and arena, two individual buildings at the end of their lifespan.

These new spaces will add to our already vibrant and diverse waterfront town.

"We've planned for this project for several years now and I am so happy to see we are finally moving ahead," Mayor Nina Bifulchi said. "It will certainly be thrilling to watch this new landmark rise at 544 River Rd. W."

Mayor Bifulchi said residents are looking forward to this important addition to the community.

"It is interesting, and a bit heartwarming, to think about the memories people will make here in the years to come," Bifulchi said. "Generations will learn to skate, discover a love for books, access their first musical show, explore new programs, and make new friendships."

In early September 2021, council awarded a \$43.4-million (plus HST) contract to Brampton-based Aquicon Construction Company Ltd. to build the new facility. A ground breaking took

place on Sept. 22 and a fundraising campaign to help pay for the build also launched.

"When we are complete in 2023, Wasaga Beach will have one of the newest community facilities of this nature in all of Ontario," Bifulchi said. "We look forward to opening the facility and letting people enjoy all it has to offer. We know it is not only about replacing aging infrastructure, it is about building facilities that the whole community can use. It is also about acting as a catalyst for future development, such as hotels and restaurants."

As part of the kick-off for the fundraising campaign, the town announced a \$1-million donation from the Cortellucci family and their company Zancor Homes, builders in the community for several years.

"The Cortellucci family and Zancor Homes build in Wasaga Beach because we believe in this community. Wasaga Beach is truly a great place to live and we are so proud to be a part of it. We know that the twin-pad arena and library will be a real gathering place for people and it honours us to play a role in making this important new space a reality," said Fabrizio Cortellucci in announcing the donation.

Wasaga Beach has a long, storied, and proud history as a hockey town. Our current arena is known across Simcoe County as the place to play and train. It has hosted the Silver Stick annual hockey tournament for decades and the town looks forward to expanding these types of opportunities. The town is

excited to welcome visiting teams to the new twin-pad facility.

"We are confident players and their families will be really impressed, especially if they are familiar with our existing single-pad arena that is now nearly 50 years old," Bifulchi said. "We also see hosting special events at our new facility as a drawing card for visitors, building on the many successful outdoor events the town has hosted over the years. We are excited about the many new possibilities because of this space and we look forward to exploring that."

Located in the east end of town, the facility will be close to the Stonebridge Town Centre – a major commercial node

in the community – and other shopping and dining amenities.

In addition, the new complex is on a major corridor, is less than a 5-minute drive from the beachfront and close to several residential neighbourhoods. A number of new residential and commercial projects are poised to happen in the vicinity and across our entire community.

WASAGA BEACH RECREATION AMENITIES

The Town of Wasaga Beach is home to several recreation amenities that augment community life. Here's a look at what you'll find in our town.

WASAGA BEACH RECPLEX

Our modern recreation facility is at 1724 Mosley St. in the central part of town.

While Wasaga's geography makes it somewhat of a linear community, the recplex is a true community gathering spot for all kinds of events and activities.

The facility has an auditorium that depending on its set-up can accommodate 250 to 450 people. This space is often used for weddings, community theatre productions, Christmas parties, dances, fundraisers, and other events. We also use room for municipal public meetings and community engagement sessions. Part of the auditorium is a state-of-the-art kitchen, a sound system, projector and screen, tables, chairs, and an auditorium.

The Oakview Room is a small space that can accommodate up to 220 people. This room is used for weddings, showers, parties, dances, fundraisers and meetings. Like the auditorium, the Oakview has a modern kitchen in it, a sound system, stage, tables, and chairs.

Our Oakview Meeting room can accommodate up to 40 people and is a great spot for seminars, workshops, corporate training, and smaller get-togethers.

A key part of the recplex is the YMCA of Simcoe-Muskoka's Wasaga Beach operation. This space includes a full-size swimming pool, a smaller pool often used for young children's lessons, workout facilities, a sauna, and an array of community programs.

OAKVIEW WOODS

Immediately next door to the recplex is Oakview Woods, one of our nearly 40 parks, and home to a number of different outdoor recreational facilities. Among them is a set of tennis courts that in the winter months serve as our outdoor rink for shinny and pleasure skating. Pickle ball courts, our skateboard park, dog park, and a BMX bike park are other elements of Oakview Woods.

WILLIAM ARNILL MEMORIAL PARK

Named after a local businessperson, William Arnill Memorial Park is part of Wasaga Sands, one of the community's premier neighbourhoods. But to locals the park is best known for its great wintertime sledding hill. The park includes other amenities such as a track and playground equipment.

MCINTYRE CREEK TENNIS COURTS

The McIntyre Creek Tennis Courts offer three separate courts for playing on. This space is popular with local tennis aficionados and newcomers to the age-old game.

WASAGA SPORTS PARK AND FERNBROOK CENTRE

North near the Nottawasaga River, next to farmland, sand dunes, and a forested section of Wasaga Beach Provincial Park, is the Wasaga Sports Park and Fernbrook Centre, a modern multi-use facility that is a hotbed of recreational activity.

Known simply as "the sports park" to locals, the site includes five full-size baseball diamonds, four full size soccer fields, six mini soccer fields, a fully accessible playground, six horse-shoe pitches, a driving range, a floating dock and canoe launch, allowing easy access to the river for canoeing and stand-up paddle boarding. For family functions and other events, there is a covered pavilion.

The Fernbrook Centre is equipped with washrooms, a food concession, and a 200-person meeting hall.

MILLS PARK

Named after one-time property owner and cottager Anabel

Sage Mills, the park is next to town hall and home to tennis courts and a playground, as well as outdoor exercise equipment. The park surrounds the Town of Wasaga Beach municipal office and includes a paved trail looping around the perimeter, connecting to municipal sidewalks that lead to the beachfront, just minutes away.

MUNICIPAL PICNIC AREA

The Municipal Picnic Area is accessible off Fifth Street and allows access to Beach Area 2. You can ride your bike to the park or take the car and leave it in the lot. The picnic area includes tables, benches, and a boardwalk you can stroll while taking in scenic Georgian Bay. This is a great spot to watch sunsets.

WASAGA STARS ARENA

The Wasaga Stars Arena is home to minor hockey and figure skating activity in Wasaga Beach. Pleasure skating is another activity that happens on this single-pad ice surface. The arena also has a banquet room. The facility was built in the mid-1970s and we are in the process of replacing it with a modern twin-pad arena. See our report for more about this investment.

GENERAL INFORMATION ABOUT PARKS

Wasaga Beach is home to almost 40 municipal parks. These are located in almost every corner of the municipality. Some feature playground structures and swings, plus benches and flowerbeds, while other parks are more passive greenspace settings. No matter what your preference, our parks offer something for everyone. We are in the final stages of creating a new Parks and Trails Master Plan that will lay the groundwork to revitalize and improve our parks and trails in the years ahead. DID YOU KNOW?

Wasaga Beach has more than 100 kilometres of both on-road and off-road trails. These trails offer wonderful places to wander throughout the year. The town manages some of these trails, while the rest are part of Wasaga Beach Provincial Park. Be sure to check out our Story Book Trails. One starts at 40th Street South and Cardinal Way and the other at the eastern entrance of Silver Birch Avenue and River Road West.



Wasaga Beach is home to dozens of parks and green spaces. The Oakview Woods Gazebo is a relaxing spot next to our RecPlex. In the summer months, our popular Jazz in the Park concert series takes place here.



Our RecPlex is home to two swimming pools, exercise equipment, gymnasium space and meeting rooms. It is one of the busiest community facilities in town.

GREAT BOATING AND FISHING OPPORTUNITIES IN WASAGA BEACH



If you like to boat or wet a line then Wasaga Beach is a great spot to pursue both of these age-old hobbies.

Our town allows boaters and anglers easy access to Nottawasaga Bay and the Nottawasaga River.

The Municipal Boat Launch is at Second Street, off Mosley Street, at Beach Area 1. This is a spot to put in your motorboat, personal watercraft, canoe, kayak, or paddle board.

The Wasaga Beach Provincial Park Boat Launch is at Jenetta Street – Beach Area 1. This is a spot to put in your motorboat, canoe, kayak, or paddle board.

You can also launch a boat or personal watercraft at Sturgeon Point Marina, 350 River Road East.

Another option for your boat or personal watercraft is Wasaga Marine at 1237 Mosley Street.

Schoonertown Parkette, at Sunset Court, off Oxbow Park Drive, is a great spot to launch your canoe, kayak, or paddle board.

We also have a launch at Klondike Park, 1888 Klondike Park Road. This is a place to put in your canoe, kayak, or paddleboard.

Nottawasaga Bay offers great fishing but it is also nice for pleasure cruising and sailing. You can also waterski on the bay, kayak, or tube.

Stand-Up paddle boarding on the bay and in the Nottawasaga River is also a fun activity that is popular with local residents and visitors.

If you are going out on the bay, make sure you have the appropriate charts and all of the other required safety equipment on board your craft. The OPP patrol these waters and do check to make sure boaters are following all of the regulations.

It is also a good idea to check the marine forecast as Nottawasaga Bay can get quite rough when the wind picks up.

From Wasaga Beach, with the right charts, you can boat to other nearby communities, including Collingwood, Thornbury, Meaford, Penetanguishene, and Midland.

A LOOK AT WASAGA BEACH SCHOOLS



St. Noel Chabanel Catholic School in the west end of town serves Catholic families.



Birchview Dunes Elementary School services families living in the east end of the community.



Worsley Elementary School meets the needs of families living in the west end of town. A fourth elementary school is planned for the south central part of the community. Most high schools students attend classes in nearby Collingwood, Stayner, or Elmvalle.

Publicly funded education in Wasaga Beach is available at three different schools.

The Simcoe County District School Board operates two of these facilities, Birchview Dunes Elementary School and Worsley Elementary School.

The Simcoe Muskoka Catholic District School Board runs the third facility, St. Noel Chabanel Catholic School.

Birchview Dunes is in the east end of town at 1315 River Rd. W., while Worsley and St. Noel are located in the west end of town at 31 40th Street South and 425 Ramblewood Dr. respectively.

All of the schools offer Junior Kindergarten to Grade 8 classes. Most students either walk or take the bus to school.

In addition, the Simcoe County District School Board has plans to build a new elementary school off Sunnidale Road, in the south central part of the community, to meet the growing demand expected due to new homes in that area.

Secondary schools are in nearby Collingwood, Elmvalle, and Stayner.

The Simcoe County District School Board operates Collingwood Collegiate Institute, Stayner Collegiate Institute, and Elmvalle District High School.

The Simcoe Muskoka Catholic District School Board operates Our Lady of the Bay Catholic High School in Collingwood.

All of these facilities offer Ontario Ministry of Education-approved curriculum courses in addition to extra-curricular activities such as team sports.

Wasaga Beach does not have a high school yet, but the Simcoe County District School Board is well aware of the need for one in the community when the population figures support the case.

As well, Wasaga Beach is home to the Ivy League International Academy, a high-end private school located on Mosley Street, just steps from the waterfront. The school prepares foreign students to attend post-secondary programs at the university level.

POST-SECONDARY SCHOOLS CLOSE BY



The South Georgian Bay Campus of Georgian College is just 20 minutes northwest of Wasaga Beach on the outskirts of Collingwood. The college has eight other campuses all within driving distance of Wasaga Beach. Public transit is available from Wasaga Beach to the South Georgian Bay Campus.

Although Wasaga Beach does not have any post-secondary institutions, the town is less than an hour drive to other Simcoe County communities that do offer such educational studies.

Georgian College has campuses in nearby Barrie, Midland, Orillia, and Collingwood.

College Boreal is a French-language college with courses available in Barrie.

Lakehead University has a campus in Orillia.

Wasaga Beach is also 90 minutes from the Greater Toronto Area, home to several other universities and colleges.

Thanks to high-speed internet, the town is able to support online studies as well.

WASAGA BEACH TRANSIT HERE TO HELP YOU OUT



Wasaga Beach Transit is served by small buses like the one pictured. We have two transit routes in town. They run seven days a week. Connecting links are available to Collingwood and Barrie. From Barrie riders can access other destinations, including the GO Train and GO Bus to Toronto.

You can get around Wasaga Beach in a variety of different ways.

The most obvious way, if you have access to a vehicle, is driving.

You can also walk or ride your bike when the weather permits.

But another option we are particularly proud of is our transit system.

Launched in 2008, Wasaga Beach Transit operates seven days a week, from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m.

Buses on two routes provide service to the community, allowing people to shop, visit friends, get to work, and travel to appointments.

The bus is popular with all ages, including young people and older residents who no longer drive.

And Wasaga Beach Transit is an affordable way to travel throughout town.

A one-way adult fare is just \$2. Seniors (60 and older) pay \$1.50, as do youth.

We also offer a monthly transit pass, starting at \$40 for adults. Students and seniors can get a pass for \$30.

Compare all that to the cost of buying a vehicle, putting

gas in it, and paying for insurance and repairs, and you will see the bus is a viable option.

Our bus system is also a comfortable and safe way to get around town.

COUNTY OF SIMCOE LINX TRANSIT SYSTEM

In addition, Wasaga Beach Transit connects to other public transportation options, including a County of Simcoe bus that travels to Collingwood and Barrie.

The County of Simcoe transit system, known as LINX, also operates a Penetanguishene/Midland to Barrie route, an Orillia to Barrie route, and a New Tecumseth to Bradford West Gwillimbury route. A future route is Midland to Orillia.

The cost to ride on a County of Simcoe bus varies from \$2 to \$6, depending on the distance. A LINX transit card is also available for your convenience.

GO TRANSIT AVAILABLE IN BARRIE

Residents who use LINX to get to Barrie can access that city's transit system, plus the GO bus and train. Go service runs to downtown Toronto seven days a week and various points in between, including Newmarket, Aurora, and York University.

We're home to the longest freshwater beach in the world and we are proud of it. You can walk our beach 365 days of the year.

CROSS-COUNTRY SKIING

Living in Wasaga Beach or spending time here means easy access to a number of outdoor opportunities.

We're home to Wasaga Beach Provincial Park, which includes several kilometres of scenic trails that you can cross-country ski. You can access the trails at Wasaga Nordic and Trail Centre at 101 Blueberry Trail. The centre is home to 30 kilometres of scenic trail that allow you to enjoy a true outdoor adventure.

Pack a lunch, strap on your skis, and go exploring on the trails. You'll see all kinds of wildlife and beautiful outdoor scenery as you make your way through the bush of the provincial park. Depending on where you live in town, Wasaga Nordic is just a 10-15 minute drive.

You can also access cross-country skiing at nearby Highlands Nordic on the Niagara Escarpment. Other options include Hardwood Ski and Bike, Wye Marsh, and Horseshoe Resort.

DOWNHILL SKIING

OK, so Wasaga Beach does not have any downhill skiing.

But if that's your thing then you are still in luck, because we are less than an hour's drive to some of Ontario's best hills.

Just west of us is the world famous Blue Mountain Resort. And just east of us is Horseshoe Resort, as well as Snow Valley Resort, and Mount St. Louis Moonstone. These places also offer snowboarding and other outdoor winter fun, plus great dining options.

Imagine being so close to such great skiing.

Locals are known to hit the slopes after work through the week and again on weekends. Retirees living here often head for the hills weekdays when things are quieter.

It's a superb lifestyle and one available in Wasaga Beach.

SNOWMOBILING

If getting on your sled and exploring is your idea of winter fun then Wasaga Beach is worth checking out.

We offer easy access to Ontario Federation of Snowmobile Club trails that are part of District 8's Mid Ontario Snowmobile Trails. Included with the district is the Wasaga Snowmobile Club. District 8 clubs are responsible for approximately 1,000 kilometres of trail. You can learn more by visiting www.most.on.ca.

Our local trails are a great way to see the stunning countryside that makes up the region.

Just think if you lived here, you could enjoy your snow machine seven days a week. Open the garage door and away you go.

HIKING

Wasaga Beach is home to some fantastic year-round hiking.

There are access points to Wasaga Beach Provincial Park throughout the community, allowing you to explore the park and get in touch with nature.

The park features a variety of terrain, too; everything from steep inclines through heavily wooded areas to level almost wide-open spaces.

The beachfront is part of the provincial park and it offers kilometres of sandy shoreline that people hike every day of the year. Winter explorers see a world completely different to the sandy summer landscape as large chunks of snow and ice pile up on the waterfront. These "mounds" can be dangerous and best enjoyed from a distance. In the spring, summer, and fall, the beachfront is a peaceful and often quiet spot to walk as Nottawasaga Bay laps at the shore.

Wasaga Beach is home to several municipal trails, too. We even have two Story Book Trails, maintained by the Wasaga Beach Public Library. These trails allow people of all ages to explore our community and enjoy an entertaining tale as they go along. Our municipal trails wind through neighbourhoods and make for an easy and safe stroll.

Wasaga Beach is also close to a number of other provincial parks that you can explore. Almost due west of town is Pretty River Valley Provincial Park, situated on the Niagara Escarpment. The park offers stunning views of Nottawasaga Bay and the rolling countryside, plus beautiful forested scenery.

A few kilometres southeast is Nottawasaga Lookout Provincial Nature Reserve. This spot also offers great hiking through the woods and magnificent views of the area.

Nearby, further south, is Devil's Glen Provincial Park and the Nottawasaga Bluffs Conservation Area. These spots also are great for hiking, bird watching, picnicking, and picture taking.

The above are just some examples of hiking opportunities less than 30 minutes from Wasaga Beach.

GOLF OPPORTUNITIES IN WASAGA AND NEARBY

MARLWOOD GOLF AND COUNTRY CLUB

Our town is home to Marlwood Golf and Country Club, an 18-hole course on Marl Lake. Built in 1928 and originally a 9-hole course, Marlwood is fun for the newcomer and seasoned golfer alike. BEACHFRONT REDEVELOPMENT HAPPENING IN WASAGA BEACH

For over 100 years, people have visited our waterfront.

Wasaga Beach is well known for its 14 kilometres of sandy shoreline along the southern edge of Nottawasaga Bay.

Family photo albums across Ontario are full of pictures captured while summer memories were made in our town.

The beach itself is part of Wasaga Beach Provincial Park. This area includes six numbered beach areas (Beach Areas 1-6), plus two other areas known as New Wasaga and Allenwood Beach.

Immediately south of Beach Area 1, known to many as the main beach, are commercial buildings and land now owned by the town. We have slated these parcels of land for redevelopment.

"Redeveloping our beachfront is a priority that council identified at the start of this term," Mayor Nina Bifulchi said. "Our intent is to rejuvenate this important part of our community."

In June 2019, the town issued a Request for Expression of Interest for the development of these lands.

That fall, through the call for interest exercise, we received nine submissions from organizations interested in developing town-owned property at the beachfront.

The submissions were evaluated and in November of 2020, council approved issuing a Request for Proposal (RFP) to the firms short-listed through the Request for Expression of Interest exercise.

An evaluation team then reviewed and scored the RFP submissions.

In May 2021, council approved Slate Asset Management L.P. as the preferred developer and authorized staff to assemble a team to negotiate with Slate the purchase and

sale terms for the property. These talks with Slate are ongoing and updates will be available on our website at www.wasagabeach.com

"Ultimately, we are going to create a new and vibrant neighbourhood in Wasaga Beach," Mayor Bifulchi said.

This will augment the experience for people visiting the Beach 1 area for a daytrip or extended stay. For residents, it will add a new waterfront lifestyle element.

"We see this area becoming a new meeting spot for people," Mayor Bifulchi said. "It will be the catalyst for this area of town."

Slate is proposing a phased approach to redevelopment, starting with mixed-use buildings, townhomes, and mid-rise condominiums. Landscaped areas, patios, and pedestrian walkways are an important component of the phased development.

"This area of our community has a long history of reinvention," Mayor Bifulchi said. "For decades it was home to large hotels, dance halls, a water slide and amusement park but people's tastes changed and so did business models. We find it exciting to think we have an opportunity for a new start like this."

In the years to come, the area will add to the Wasaga Beach experience.


